

Hymns Old & New No. 148

Born in 1950, Graham Kendrick, the writer of this hymn, was the son of a Baptist minister. He has been particularly associated with the 'March for Jesus' witness and has written such well-loved hymns and songs as *Make way*, *make way for the King of Kings*; *Shine Jesus, shine*; *Meekness and majesty*; *Restore*, *O Lord, the honour of your name* and *All I once held dear (Knowing You)*.

Kendrick wrote this hymn, '*The Servant King*' to give it its proper title, for the Christian arts festival, Greenbelt. As with most of his other hymns, he wrote both the words and music, picking out the tune on his piano at home. This hymn has a wonderful theological sweep and breadth. Beginning with the Incarnation - God becoming human - other verses include Gethsemene 'there in the garden of tears' and Calvary 'the scars that speak of sacrifice'. The hymn points to a central paradox of Christian faith; that Jesus is both king and servant, priest and sacrifice, the one who conquers through love; before challenging the singer to a response, 'so let us learn how to serve, and in our lives enthrone Him'. This is a contemporary hymn which does not 'dumb down' in terms of subtlety or poetry, nor does it suffer from the excessive 'me-centred-ness' of so many worship songs that have been written in recent years.

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

SURPRISED BY JOY

Those who collect the shoeboxes which are annually filled by members of the parish church and primary school as part of *Operation Christmas Child* (*OCC*), warn that "They all have to be checked — you'd never believe what some people put in them!"

Despite warnings to the contrary, some well-meaning people have been known to put in toy guns HF and knives, chemicals (e.g. nail varnish or medicine) and things that would be dangerous if swallowed by small children (e.g. marbles and pins). Such errors of judgement are far outweighed by the kind and thoughtful generosity shown by the majority of shoebox donors.

There is something wonderfully simple about the idea — fill a small box and send it to an unknown and needy child. The films made by the OCC show clearly that the pleasure taken in choosing what to put in the boxes is as nothing to the joy of those who receive them. All of which reminds us of the Gift that, for those who can see past the wrappings, is the 'reason for the season' : the Christ-child. What on earth did God think He was doing? Had we wanted to change the course of history for good and secure eternity in human hearts, then doing so through a baby born to a poor family, living under occupation in an unimportant part of the world, is not what we would have done.

> God has clearly always loved surprises. The account of His dealings with humanity in the Bible is full of them, - but in Jesus Christ, He saved His best until last.

May you, to use the title of the autobiography of C.S. Lewis, be once again *Surprised by Joy* this Christmas.

Clinical Care We are very proud to announce that our practice was rated the highest out of all the practices in Suffolk for the clinical care we provided in 2011-12. In recent years the practice has consistently achieved the maximum score on all the clinical indicators.

Annual 'Flu Vaccinations We had an excellent turnout at our two 'flu clinics. Unfortunately delays in production of the vaccine meant that we had to postpone our East Bergholt clinic until after the Capel clinic. We vaccinated 2,084 patients in two days and raised a staggering £1,097 for the charity EACH. Thank you all.

Volunteers still needed Medical students from UEA and Cambridge have been attending the practice since September for training with our partners and Dr James Sherifi. We are still looking for volunteers with any interesting conditions, both female and male. Transport can be arranged if you have difficultly getting to the surgery.

David Watson reports **CREDIT & DEBIT CARD SCAM**

A warning has been issued about a particular type of credit and debit card fraud which is booming. The so-called 'courier' scam has been on the march since the introduction of chip and PIN cards made other types of fraud harder. Experts say that elderly people may be particularly at risk.

The scam starts when you get a phone call from someone who typically

Consider the use of timers to light claims to be from the security or fraud department of your bank. They say that their records have flagged up a fraudulent transaction on your card. According to the Metropolitan Police, in order to win your trust they may tell you to ring the bank back using the phone number printed on the back of your bank card - but the fraudster has kept the telephone line open, so even though you call the bank, the call does not go through. Instead you are unknowingly connected straight back to the fraudster. The thieves explain that in order to protect your card they'll need to come and collect it by courier.

They will also ask that you either key in your PIN on the phone, or write it down and put it in the envelope with the card. The fraudster then hires a genuine courier to collect the envelope. The courier, who is an unwitting pawn in the scam, then hands over the envelope to the fraudster, who uses the card and PIN to withdraw cash from cash machines. Katy Worobec, Head of Fraud Control, Financial Fraud Action UK said that scammers had particularly been targeting elderly people although the scam is spreading.

PCSO Mark Hibben reports **CRIME PREVENTION**

Some simple crime prevention tips:

- Do not leave valuables on show in shopping trolleys, cars or bags
- an otherwise empty home; also leave a radio on.
- Check locks on your house, gate, outhouse are in good order
- Be aware of bogus callers
- Make sure your smoke alarms are working - if you cannnot reach them ask a trusted person to test them for you.
- Consider the use of security lights and be vigilant regarding metal theft, heating oil theft and damage to public property, e.g. play equipment.
- Be a good neighbour to those who are older, or vulnerable or living alone. Don't wait to be asked.

DISTINGUISHED OF DEDHAM - 2

PAST TIMES



WILLIAM HAGGAR

An illegitimate son of a Dedham housemaid, he became a musician, actor, theatre proprietor, photographer and fairground showman - and a pioneer film-maker. William Haggar (1851-1925), some of whose films featured in the Dedham *Village Film Festival* earlier this year, is the subject of a vivid biography by Peter Yorke, his great-grandson.

William Haggar

Born in Dedham, to a housemaid working in service

here, Haggar left the village while still in his teens. Learning to play the cornet, he got a job as musician with a travelling theatre company. In 1871, he married Sarah, an actress. Together they travelled for nearly forty years through England, and South and West Wales "following the coal". By 1891, he and Sarah had eleven children, eight of them surviving to adulthood. Eventually becoming the boss of his own theatre company, he spent £80 on a film projector which was worked by limelight. In April 1898, after several experimental explosions, Haggar and his sons pushed his first 'Bioscope Exhibition' onto a fairground in Aberavon.

On the first day they took a massive $\pounds 15$, but the enterprise nearly foundered when a six-month pit-strike deprived them of custom. By 1901 they had done well enough to buy a portable steam engine to generate electric light, but now Haggar faced competition from showmen with other attractions as well as films. The supply of films was drying so Haggar bought a cine-camera and film stock and began experimenting. As well as taking

'actuality' subjects, he tried his hand at a few 'made-up' films, using the theatrical companies' two actors, its plots and scenery.

In 1902 he hit the jackpot, filming The Maid of Cefn Ydfa, a romantic tragedy based on a novel by Isaac Hughes. Shot in an hour and a half. it lasted just six minutes. It was said that "when Haggar first put on The Maid, any other show could close down".

During the next three years, Haggar made *The Poachers*, a threeminute chase film which sold more than any other film to that time. Haggar's *Life of Charles Peace*, combined a drama and a chase, concluding sensationally with Peace's drop from the gallows. In his films Haggar introduced innovations such as panning shots,

camera placing, and cutting to produce more immediate, less stage-bound films, than most of his contemporaries. He also made slapstick comedies, including the *Mirthful Mary* series, in which an actress of formidable stature and voluminous underwear lays into snowballers, pub drinkers, policemen and magistrates - a form of anti-authoritarian humour that was sure to appeal to his fairground audiences. So well did this fare go down that he acquired three showman's traction engines and two huge ornate organ showfronts brilliant with coloured lights. After Sarah's death in 1909, Haggar ceased the touring and opened a chain of cinemas. His last years were spent in an honoured retirement, and he died in February 1925. He had said there would be "money in it" - and he was right. He left £16,912 - something like £1.5 million today.

Yorke tells Haggar's story and relates the rediscovery and recognition of the pioneering quality of William's eight surviving films. Illustrations from the time, interspersed with the text, include portraits of the family in theatrical costume, the showfronts and stills from the films with the titles and synopses of some seventy Haggar films. There are full indexes. This book will be of interest to all who want to know more about the origins of the British film industry, or a social history that, but for Mr. Yorke's endeavours, might have been forgotten.
