GOD IN THE ARTS

'HE GAVE US EYES TO SEE THEM' – THE CHURCH BUILDING

Each month we have been following in the footsteps of George Herbert and making our way through the church building from the entrance door to the altar - pausing at the font, by kneelers, candlesticks, windows, monuments, pulpit, ceiling, bells and choir stalls. They all form part of the church building: a



witness to its history and tradition. They speak to us of beauty and craftsmanship, of art and skill, of dedication and faith. We look around. We find our hearts raised to heaven in praise for all we see, and remember Jesus talking about the stones speaking out on that first Palm Sunday.

And when people enter the church building, they become the living stones – filling the air with hymn and psalm, pulling the ropes for the bells to ring out, lighting candles to shine in the dark, kneeling in prayer, and going to the altar to feed on the Bread of life. A church building is an offering, and we, as we worship, make our offering. We set aside time and attention, and bring to God our lives in His service.

All Saints Church in Brockhampton, just south of Hereford, is a wonderful example of the Arts and Crafts movement. Outside and within there is much to admire - including a frontal, hymn book covers and embroidered seat covers that were left on the altar in 1960 by an anonymous donor. They were a thank offering for that church being there and open. It is a reminder of the journey called of us as we become living stones, offering our love and faith and service for the Kingdom.

Churches up and down the land invite us all to enter and make that journey, both physically and in faith. As Herbert's poem 'The Invitation' expresses it:

'Come ye hither all, whose love Is your dove, And exalts you to the sky: Here is love, which having breath Ev'n in death, After death can never die.'

Thank you to those of you who were able to attend my licensing recently, and to all the people who worked so hard to make the service such a meaningful

occasion. It's great to be here!

Do you like parties? Christmas is a party.

Specifically, it's a birthday party — for Jesus — and birthdays are meant to be celebrated. It's why we say "Merry Christmas!" What are you going to celebrate this Christmas? That you've made it through another year.... that you will be at home with family.....that you'll be getting an extra bonus......that you've still got a job and a home...... or maybe you'll find it hard to celebrate because you are just managing to survive. Preparing for Christmas can be a lot of work, especially for parents. With the pressure of buying gifts, sending greeting cards, decorating our homes, putting up lights, cooking, attending parties, and cleaning up afterward, we may have little time to actually enjoy the meaning of Christmas.

Christine Frost writes:

The Parish Council held a very well attended 'Business Breakfast' at the Boathouse Restaurant in November and would like to thank the Boathouse for their hospitality and other local businesses that provided refreshments. The speakers were Pam Donnelly from Colchester Borough Council, in her role as Chair of the Safety Partnership, Karen Turnbull, CBC's Economic Growth Development Manager, Inspector Danielle Booth, who is responsible for local community policing and Angie Pearson, Crime Prevention Tactical Advisor. We were also pleased to welcome Rev. Antony Wilson on his first full day in Dedham. Pam spoke about the benefits of partnership working and encouraged local bushiness to form a business association. Karen discussed the changes affecting trade on the high streets of towns and villages. She spoke • Car parking – charges and the need to of possible ways to encourage tourism in Dedham, including the suggestion of creating an annual festival. She also said that CBC are still following a policy which was first implemented around 20 years ago to actively avoid promoting Dedham as a tourist venue because of perceived overcrowding. This met with some surprise in the room and will be discussed in full by DPC at a forthcoming meeting. Danielle Booth talked about the changes in police priorities, explaining she had two Sergeants, 10 Constables, 10 Police Community Support Officers and four special Constables to police her area.

She spoke about the concerns about local repeat crimes, which had affected the Essex Rose Tea rooms.

Angie Pearson talked about Business Watch, also informal networks that could keep businesses in touch with one another and gave advice about business security. She agreed to speak to the Essex Rose representatives at the end of the meeting.

During the question and answer session the following topics were discussed:

- The apparent conflict between the aims of the Dedham Vale Society and the environment lobby to keep the car driving visitors out of the Dedham Vale, which has impacted on Dedham village and the aims of the businesses to provide a service to village residents throughout the
- Street lighting, especially in the High Street, Mill Lane and the Drift.
- find additional car parking capacity.
- The possible formation of a business association or village partnership.
- The refurbishment of the business notice board in the car park and the value of reissuing the visitor leaflet.
- Mobile phone coverage was highlighted as needing improvement in the village.
- DPC website and the use of social media.

ARDLEIGH SURGERY

October and November are traditionally very busy months in general practice and this year has been no different. Our flu campaign has been and gone and we will (hopefully!) achieve our target of vaccinating 75% of those who are eligible. This year has seen a rise in the number of patients who don't qualify for an NHS vaccination trying to obtain one at the surgery. Unfortunately we are unable to vaccinate anyone who is outside the NHS flu programme, but many of the local pharmacies and supermarkets offer immunisation at around £5. Those of you who are eligible, please make a note in your 2017 diaries to contact the surgery in September next year to book your flu jab.

Those of you who visited the surgery in small changes to the appointment late October, you will know that we had a Care Quality Commission (CQC) of appointments. inspection on 1st November. The visit seemed to go well and the inspectors talked at length to our staff, our patients and the doctors. The report into their visit will be published around Christmas time and copies of it will be available at the practice and on our website. The report will also include our rating. Our Patient Participation Group (PPG) will be having a meeting to discuss the CQC findings and you would be more than welcome to come along, see how the PPG works and discuss the findings with members of the practice. Details of the date and time will be advertised later.

When Dr Owens retired in June, Dr Emily Foster joined us, working three days a week. She has now decided that Ardleigh Surgery is not the practice for her and she is leaving during November. Everyone, I am sure, wishes her well in her new practice. We will be joined during the first week of December by Dr Rebecca Thompson, who comes to us from a practice in Suffolk. Dr Thompson lives locally and will be working three days a week with us, and one day a week at St Helena Hospice in Colchester. 
