
This has deservedly become one of the most popular hymns in Britain. The author originally intended it to be sung as a dialogue song between a solo voice and a congregational response, but it is now generally treated as a hymn.

The seed of music was planted early in Dan Schutte's life through the inspiration of his grandparents, both of whom were accomplished musicians. He loved to listen to them play the piano and he'd sit for hours at the keyboard making up melodies. It was during his early college years in the Jesuit seminary that Dan began to experience the connection between music and communal worship. He learned firsthand how music can move a soul and bring one into the presence of God. Beauty can touch the human heart in a powerful way and open a person's heart to experience the divine.

Along with a fellow seminarian, he began to write music for the worship of his Jesuit community. Historically it was written at a time when the liturgy of the Roman Catholic church was being renewed and adapted. This hymn is based on *Isaiah* 6, where in a vision the prophet hears the call of God and responds to it with awe and in humility.

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

A LOVE THAT DARES TO SPEAK

hen the late Philip Gould, a New Labour strategist, spoke of his Christian faith in the weeks before he died, it was as if the subject was just too embarrassing for the journalist to report properly. Writing about that recently, Allison Pearson observed,

'These days, celebrities can confess to pretty much anything - drugs, facelifts... but when it comes to religious belief suddenly everyone squirms and studies their shoes. Homosexuality is no longer the love that dare not speak its name, Oscar; now it's Christianity.' *

At a time when our Church is seemingly obsessed with the making (or preventing) of women bishops, or who will be the next Archbishop, there is something that

should be concerning us far more. Baroness Warsi, a Muslim, was the first person in the Cabinet to draw national attention to it, though it has been obvious to many for some time; that is, our country faces a 'rising tide of militant secularisation'. Put simply, being anti-God is now OK, being religious is thought weird. Pearson commented,

Pass

'Actually, I think Lady Warsi understated the case. Mocked, marginalised and increasingly absent from people's lives, the Church of England is on course to disappear from these isles within three generations, unless there's a miracle. Anyone who doubts this thesis is not paying attention.'

his is alarming, until you realise that this has always been the case. The Church (of England, or of anywhere) is only ever about three generations away from extinction. If parents fail their children then grandparents can act as a safety net, and help to teach the children 'in the way they should go'. If nobody teaches the Christian faith attractively for three generations or so then, inevitably, churches close. Our Church has sought to lessen the impact of the 'tide going out' by amalgamating parishes, giving its ministers many more churches to look after. A typical vicar

today is like a rural dean was a generation ago, and one needs to consult an oracle to work out which building they will be in and when. This cannot go on, if only because it just isn't

working. With no time for people and no time to prepare to teach, Christian ministers face burn-out and failure in the one area that is vital, which is the passing of faith to the next generation. What is needed, as it always has been, is for Christian parents, and for pastor / teachers, to 'pass it on' in love, even in the face of derision, or worse.

aster once again reminds us that, just when the Christian faith looked at its weakest, God in Christ showed His resurrection power. May He do so in your life, in the lives of others, and in the Church, to His glory.

children. I provided some accountancy guidance. Frankly, our work was only a tiny contribution to the daily needs of Kasana, but we can now tell others of the Centre and perhaps help to find ongoing support for the children, which is more important.


One baby was found in a latrine, another in a field of maize. Daniel, an

engaging three-yearold, has not known his mother who died giving birth to him. His father is busy looking after his cattle and he is not able to look after his young son. Daniel's older siblings

are at senior school
and are not yet old enough
to care for him. There is no extended family to help.

Every child at New Hope has a similar story to Daniel. Of course, thousands of unwanted children in Uganda do not receive such an opportunity. New Hope provides a

means for us to help some. through a Christian, family and educational home for the children. Each group of 20 children has a Ugandan "mother and father", and various "grandmothers" also help. Some children live off-site and come to

The Prime Minister and the Royal Family find themselves at odds in the wake of a national tragedy in this drama. On 31 August 1997, Diana, Princess of Wales died in a car accident in Paris. Despite the breakup of her marriage, she was still one of the most famous and best-loved women in the world, and the public outpouring of emotion over her passing was immediate and intense. However, given the circumstances of Diana's breakup with Charles, official spokespeople for the Royal Family were uncertain about how to publicly address her passing. It didn't take long for the media to pick up on the hesitation of Buckingham Palace to pay homage to Diana, and many saw this as a sign of the cool emotional distance so often attributed to the royals, which in this case was widely seen as an insult against Diana and the many people who loved her. Prime Minister Tony Blair (Michael Sheen) took it upon himself to persuade Queen Elizabeth II (Helen Mirren) to make a statement in tribute to Diana, an action that went against the taciturn Queen's usual nature.


