SONGS OF PRAISE

'In sweet music is such art'

'CHORALE ST ANTONI' - BY BRAHMS

June 13 is the feast day of Anthony of Padua, a saint who lived a quiet, contemplative life until he was 25. Fired with missionary zeal, he joined the Franciscans and set out for Morocco, but illness forced him to return to Europe. There he suddenly discovered his gift for preaching. His first sermon was to the toughest of all congregations – other priests. But they were impressed by the brilliant way in which his studies and experiences came together in his sermon. For nine years St Anthony exercised a remarkable preaching ministry throughout Italy. He died when he was only 36 in 1231. Such was his life that he was canonised the following year. Statues of St Anthony often show him as a slight man, holding the child Jesus and a lily.

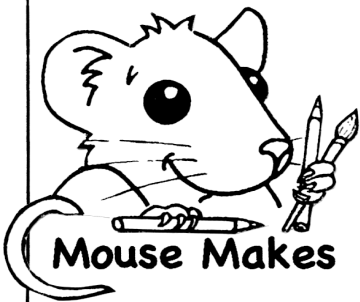


Johannes Brahms

'There is no real creating without hard work. That which you would call invention is simply an inspiration for which I am not responsible, which is no merit of mine. It is a present, a gift, which I ought even to despise until I have made it my own by dint of hard work.' The words sound like St Anthony, but they were spoken by a composer, who, 650 years later, jotted down in his notebook, *Chorale St Antoni*. Brahms copied this melody from a divertimento of Haydn. The precise source of the St Anthony Chorale has never been discovered, but it would be nice to think that the melody of St Anthony of Padua's preaching inspired the melody of this chorale.

Some years later Brahms began work on a set of variations, initially for two pianos and then for full orchestra. Just like St Anthony waiting all those years to begin his preaching ministry in 1222, so this music was Brahms' first symphonic work after fourteen years. The wind instruments play the melody of the chorale, and then eight variations follow. At one moment, we hear the clarinets and bassoons; the next, it is the strings. Then the oboes and horn to be followed by flute and violas. Different sounds, different textures, different explorations of the theme that lead us to the finale. It is a ground bass repeated twelve times in a variety of harmonies. The brass sounds out the theme over woodwind and strings, and the music reaches a glorious end. In the *St Anthony Variations*, Brahms' skill and inspiration allow that glorious melody to sound out – like St Anthony proclaiming the melody of his sermon so many centuries before in Italy.

THE SOUND OF SILENCE

'We worship a God who doesn't always speak - at times his silence can be almost impossible to reconcile with our own faith. Could an understanding of silence help us appreciate better this aspect of the divine?' So wrote Lucinda van der Hart in a magazine I was reading recently.

That is not the same thing as there *being* none, however. 'Waiting upon God' for extended periods of time may not come easily, but it comes with an assurance of His blessing. Jesus did it (all those days in the wilderness) and we should not be surprised to find that, at several times in our life, we too have some 'wilderness time'.

Anyone who knows me might conclude that, talkative as I am (and always have been!) the keeping of silence, whether it be voluntary or enforced, might not come easily to me. Yet, perhaps to your surprise, I have always enjoyed times of silent retreat and as I have grown older I have found that I need longer and longer times of 'silent withdrawal' to gather my strength for the next 'communicative phase'.



Every Saturday morning at 9.30 a.m. for many years there has been a few people coming to the parish church to keep a vigil of silent prayer. For half-an-hour they sit in the South Chapel in church, ignoring the distractions that occur even in a place set aside for prayer. People, matters great and small, requests for prayer written on slips and put in the 'prayer box' near the votive candle stand, are all lifted to God in silence.

Whether it has been mountains, with their winds that carry all sound away, or libraries with their purposeful hush, or periods of deafness that have been caused by a childhood injury, 'the sound of silence' has been an important part of my formation as a Christian.

And does God speak? Yes, for He is a God who delights to reveal Himself in words that we may know Him and His will. The Bible is His authoritative word, written. If you read it, you will hear Him speak. There are other ways in which we will hear Him. Sometimes it will be through messengers of His truth (whether they realise it or not), in what people say to us. And sometimes - it will be in the silence.

The silence of God, however, is quite another matter. His silence can be very uncomfortable. Prayers of the heart, spoken and unsaid, cry out for an answer - and it seems there is none.

FAMERS' MARKET

Following a survey completed by residents, councillors discussed the holding of a regular Farmers' Market in Royal Square. This topic raised some controversy within the village – particularly from residents living around its proposed location. The Council has listened to the concerns of residents most affected but we also wished to respect the views of the majority of residents responding to our survey, 93% of whom supported the proposed Market. Prior investigation of alternative locations produced a kind offer from the Sarters at the Fountain House, to use a field in front of their house which provides access to both the High Street and the Mill Lane car park. It was therefore agreed to hold a monthly Farmers' Market on this land, on the first Saturday of every month, for a trial basis of six months. The first market will take place on **Saturday 6 July**. Applications for a stall at the market should be sent to clerk@dedhamparishcouncil.org.uk: for the first Saturday only the cost of a stall is being reduced to £15. Please support this event which is being organised as part of our income generation strategy for the village.



RE-ELECTIONS

Also held in May was the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council where the Council re-elects its officers for the year. No changes in roles or responsibilities were agreed for the forthcoming year as there was general agreement that the Council needed to consolidate its experience and build on what we believe has generally been a positive start.

SCHOOL LIAISON & LAND

Other issues of note were that the Council has approved its nomination of Cllr. Tony Regan as one of the two Community Governors for Dedham Primary School; he will also undertake the liaison role between the School and the Council.

After consideration of a report from local residents, the Council decided not to progress with a community asset transfer of land currently owned by Essex County Council. Despite the ecological value of the land, its location and future upkeep was not something the Council believed it should take on at this time given its limited value as a general community asset.

One thousand ducks were released, and the first duck took around 20 minutes to cross the finish line, just past the willow trees. The winning duck no. 408 was raced by Anna Sheffield, who won the first prize of £30. The last duck home was Duck 908, raced by Poppy Gibson, who was awarded the wooden spoon.

The Guides will be using their donation to help fund a much needed shed required to house their equipment and for a sleepover they want to do in London. Many thanks to everyone who supported this event.

A brave choice, for this play's strength lies in its script and character interaction. But, in the capable hands of the Dedham Players, the play's witty words and woven relationships were brought to life in an absorbing and moving way.

The whole was clearly held together by its lead, played extremely capably by Paul George, who led in every scene and around whom the other characters wove their parts. George really brought Turing to life - conjuring his nervous and nerdy temperament from the very first, while allowing the passion of his genius to pour forth in certain scenes, most markedly in his soliloquies.

There were no weak performances among the cast, though special mention could be made of new member, Claire Nicholson, as the warm and convincing Pat Green, as well as Don Poar, whose performance of Dillwyn Knox wove true magic alongside Turing in the few scenes they shared.

Altogether a great production, seamlessly executed by not just the cast, but a professional lighting, scenery, props, backstage and administrative crew.

◆ WILLIAM BURKITT TRICENTENARY AWARD To mark the three hundredth anniversary of the death of William Burkitt

◆ TOM KEATING'S PAINTING The painting of *The Good Shepherd of Dedham*, the last painting completed by Tom Keating [in the style of Samuel Palmer] was given to the parish church during Revd. Ron Richards' incumbency and not [as had been printed in the Magazine] his predecessor. [The story of how Keating came to paint it and give it to the church is told in that issue].

Fifty Years Ago **June 1963**

◆ IGNORANCE OF CHRISTIANITY The Vicar, Canon Johnny Johnston, wrote: *'It is very evideny from the trend of things today that Christians must make a stand for their faith. There is so much ignorance abroad that it is alarming. Only the other day I heard a well known psychiatrist speak of the enslavement of the Church of England in contrast with the freedom of medicine. I used to think that the basic facts of Christianity were known (at any rate in theory) to everyone in the land, even if they have never entered a church. But what the vast majority of our people do not, will not, or cannot apprehend is the true significance of Jesus Christ. To most of them he is a figure of history. His life is a pretty story for children. His Church an irrelevant institution which yet gives a certain colour to the great occasions of life. But we must tell them that Jesus is the revelation of God, the Lord of all human life, the Saviour and Judge of men. How can we do this? It is your job as well as mine. We are to be the Lord's forerunners. He has no other.'*

◆ ESSEX COUNTY HOSPITAL 'Mr. Hewitt, the President of ECH, again wishes to thank all those who kindly responded to the appeal... the amount sent was 458 pounds and 84 eggs, while the total received from all surrounding districts was 5,939 pounds, of which 260 pounds were tea, 920 eggs and £914/9 in money.'
