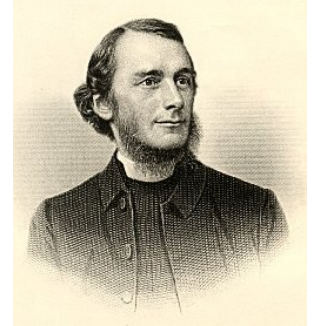

SONGS OF PRAISE

*Peace, perfect peace, in this dark world of sin?
The blood of Jesus whispers peace within.*
Hymns Old & New, 413



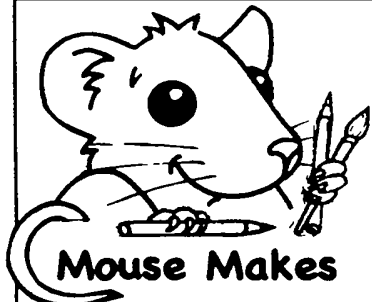
Edward Bickersteth (1825-1906) was vicar of Christ Church, Hampstead, when in 1875 he was staying with his family in Harrogate. His relative, Archdeacon Hill of Liverpool, was dying and, finding him troubled in mind, he wrote for him these beautiful words. Bickersteth had been on a solitary walk on the moors, reflecting on that morning's sermon preached by the vicar, Canon Gibbon, which had had as its text: *'Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee'* (Isaiah 26:3).

The hymn consists of a question and answer in each verse (except the last), although this is difficult to convey as it is sung unless, perhaps, it is sung antiphonally. This means that the inattentive are inclined to regard the first part of each verse, wrongly, to be a statement of fact. The hymn has been translated into many languages; Bickersteth himself heard it sung in Japanese and Chinese when, as Bishop of Exeter, he toured the Far East.

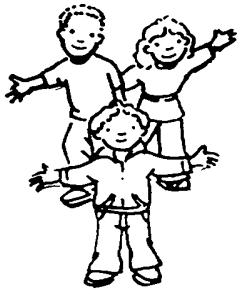
Later on, one of his sisters drew his attention to the fact that his hymn, beautiful as it was, contained no reference to the trial of physical suffering. 'That is soon remedied', he replied, and wrote:
*Peace, perfect peace, 'mid suffering's sharpest throes?
The sympathy of Jesus breathes repose.*

These additional lines did not carry the same appeal as the rest of the hymn and do not generally now appear in hymn-books. It was said of him that 'no bishop of our time has been so devoted to the foreign missionary enterprise and so identified with its interests as Bishop Bickersteth.' In 1900 he was weakened by influenza and tendered his resignation as bishop. He gradually weakened, and died in 1906, when he was laid to rest at Watton, in Hertfordshire, in the parish where he had been a child of the rectory.

The original tune was PAX TECUM, by G.T. Caldbeck (1852-1918), but it is now usually sung to the lovely SONG 46, by Orlando Gibbons (1583-

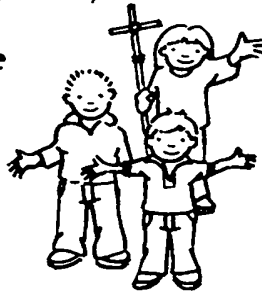

We are now fortunate to have two defibrillators in the village. One is located beside the Craft Centre, with thanks to the East of England Co-op for providing this equipment along with the support of the parish council. It is available to the general public 24/7, 365 days a year. If you need to access it at any time, please follow the instructions on the box, which requires you to ring 999. They will give you a code to unlock the box, as well as sending an ambulance for assistance.

The second is located within the Sports Pavilion on the Duchy Field, obtained through Dedham Old Boys Football Club with the help of the Essex and Suffolk Border League. This can be used by anyone using or hiring the Sports Pavilion during village sports events. Using the defibrillators do not require medical training and are designed for use by the general public in case of emergency. However, a first aid training evening will be organised shortly. PARISH ASSEMBLY 2015

I am pleased to report an encouraging turnout for our new format Assembly this year which was attended by over 70 villagers. The focus was on 'Planning.' The meeting encouraged wide participation and questions of our two speakers, Paul Gallifant, from the Dedham Vale Society and Planner Officer Karen Syrett from Colchester Borough Council. Paul's focus was on the value and beauty of the Dedham Vale and the importance of maintaining this and minimising the impact of planning decisions on its periphery and Karen presented some 'realisms' about the need for more housing and some facts about national and local policies, including the new Colchester Local Plan.

There appears to be no immediate threat of any large scale development in Dedham as we are predominantly located within the AONB, which has

protected status. In the open discussion which followed, issues prioritised by residents were:

- Retention and conservation of the AONB and preservation of identity for Dedham Village
- Additional 'affordable' housing – particularly smaller properties for purchase.
- Investigation of very limited, controlled development on the boundaries of village envelopes to fulfil expressly defined needs.
- Preservation and enhancement of our local economy to maintain a successful environment for local businesses.
- Implications of potential large-scale development immediately on our Parish Boundary.
- Development of Village infrastructure; i.e. parking and road network – particularly congestion issues along Crown Street.

Following this, the Parish Council agreed at its Annual Meeting in May to establish a new 'Strategic Development Advisory Group' whose purpose will be "To consider the best framework for reviewing or replacing the Parish Plan, identifying and incorporating as necessary the priorities facing Dedham over the next 5 to 10 years". Within this a key issue will be the mechanisms for consultation with the Village.

Membership of the Group will be Cllrs. Beeton, Regan, Taylor, Baker and Frost.

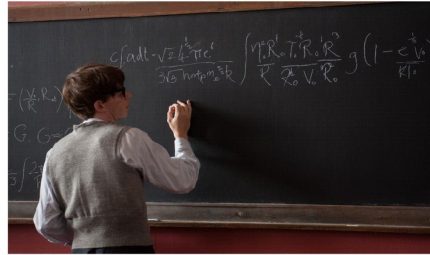
