Hymns Old & New No. 517


St. Thomas's Day is now observed on 3 July (formerly it was on 21 December, the shortest day). Topically, this unusual hymn mentions doubt in its first line. Written by Bernhardt Severin Ingeman (1789-1862) in 1825, it was published in 1859. Ingemann was a legendary figure in Denmark, whose influence for good on children was second only to fellow-countryman Hans Christian Anderson. On his 70th birthday Ingemann was presented with a golden horn ornamented with figures from his poems and stories and paid for by donations from children throughout the country.

In 1867 the editor of *The People's Hymnal* asked the Rev'd. Sabine Baring -Gould, author of *Onward Christian Soldiers*, (later Rector of East Mersea, near Colchester) to look at the Danish hymnal to "see if any merited translation." The hymn appeared, considerably altered, in the second edition of *Hymns Ancient & Modern* in 1875.

Erik Routley, in *Hymns and the Faith*, observed that strictly-speaking this is a song rather than a hymn, for it is not addressed to God and its subject matter is human hope and aspiration. He also wrote "the men who make history and do the will of God are those who are content to keep moving, to travel light, not looking back with regrets for the pleasures and satisfactions that are past, and not encumbering themselves with heavy loads of rights, honours, and ambitions."

This hymn was the subject of controversy in 1987. Writing in the *Daily Telegraph*, Fritz Spiegel revealed that during a rehearsal for BBC Radio's morning service a preacher had objected to the line "Brother clasps the hand of brother" and wanted it changed to "Person clasps the hand of person". The offending verse was omitted from the broadcast. It has since been re-written for our hymn book thus, "so we march in hope united".


The most common tune used is MARCHING, which was specially written for these words by Martin Shaw (1875-1958), for use at St. Mary's, Primrose Hill, in London, where he was organist.

the outside of the chancel which made me think about it: the widely different uses we can make of the word render.

First, there is 'to cause or become'. as in he was rendered helpless. (Far too many on Saturday night in Colchester, perhaps?). Next; 'to give assistance', as in she rendered aid to the injured (a paramedic on-call to the above?) Then, 'to submit or send in', as in he rendered his accounts (before the tax deadline, one hopes).

Another meaning; 'to represent or portray artistically, or musically', as in he rendered the work faithfully (which does mean it was any good). A fifth meaning; 'to translate', as in he rendered it from the original Greek (though perhaps not any clearer). Sixth meaning; 'to melt down or extract', as in he rendered the fat from the carcase (which we would rather not know about, thank you).

Seventh meaning; 'to give a service', as in he rendered thanks (that he did not have to perform the sixth meaning, for example). The eighth, and rather

topical meaning; 'to cover stone or bricks with plaster' as in the whole chancel is being rendered for the first time in a century' (thanks to a generous legacy and the Friends of Dedham Church).

None of the above convey the It was the beginning of the repairs to meaning which lesus had in mind when he answered a trick question from a smart-aleck lawyer, about the payment of taxes. lesus called for a coin in which the tax would have been paid. and he was given a denarius. > lesus' reply, which was masterly in its double-meaning, was they should "render unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's, and unto God the things that are God's". (St. Matthew 22:21). For a while his critics were silenced. since they could not from his answer condemn him either as a traitor or as someone unfaithful to God's law.

Augustus was a god.

The challenge that comes to us from lesus' reply is for us to discern what we should render (i.e. 'to pay as a due') to civil authorities (not just in money, but in our respect, for example) and what we should render to God (not

just in respect, but in our money, for example). May God grant you both wisdom and generosity in your decisions.



DRAINAGE PROBLEM

Residents of the west end of the village will be pleased to hear that Anglian Water are finally going to take some action regarding the appalling sewage odours that pervade the area from time to time. Monitors are to be installed within the sewage system at the junction of High Street and Stratford Road and also adjacent to Mill House in Mill Lane. This will hopefully provide enough information about the frequency and extent of the odours to enable Anglian Water to carry out appropriate remedial action. This is in response to letters written to Anglian Water by several Dedham residents; it has been ongoing for over ten years, without a satisfactory resolution.

The Parish Council are now also monitoring the situation and will escalate this matter if a solution is not provided by Anglian Water.

The Parish Council have arranged for the installation of another temporary toilet in addition to those already located in the car park. All the temporary toilets will remain in situ until refurbishment work on the existing toilets has concluded, hopefully in July.

FRIENDS' GOLF DAY

The third annual Friends of Dedham Church Charity Golf Day held at Hintlesham Hall Golf Club proved a great success. The day is becoming a popular fixture on the golf calendar, with 74 players taking part, up on last year's figure. We are also very grateful to **Barbara Fayers** (nee Parnell) who now lives in Suffolk, for a copy of this photograph. There is a telegraph pole in place - which may help to date it. The name on the main sign is "NICHOLL'. The small sign by the drainpipe reads "Good accommodation for cyclists". The dip in the roof line may give some indication of the need for repair of the building, but the large mark above the cart may have been a blemish on an earlier copy of the photograph, rather than a failure of the external plaster. The lamp under the sign may have been an indication that this was a Public House, a form of advertising, in fact.

Ten Years Ago July 1999

♦ ASSEMBLY ROOMS It was announced that the building and rooms within it were to be re-named, prior to the re-opening later in the year. The building was to revert to its original name (by which it had been known for more than 225 years), i.e. "Assembly Rooms". In honour of William W. Hewitt, who had given the building to the community in 1917, the main hall was to be called the "Hewitt Hall" (similar to "Hewitt Memorial Hall" which had, for just over eighty years, been the name of the whole building). One room was to be called the "Reading Room", because Mr. Hewitt had particularly wanted this to be a feature (i.e. the provision of a library - now fulfilled through the provision of books for the pre-school nursery) and another was to be named the "Mallett Room", in memory of the late Miss Betty Mallett, who had for so many years been associated with the building.

Fifty Years Ago July 1959

- ♦ A DIOCESAN MISSIONARY FESTIVAL was held in Dedham but the support by other churches was 'disappointing'.
- **SCHOOLS** The Vicar taught in "our Church School, Littlegarth School and Manningtree Secondary Modern School on certain days during the week".
- ♦ BISHOP ON TOUR The Rt. Rev'd Falkner Allison, Bishop of Chelmsford, was on a preaching tour of the USA and Canada; during his absence "the Bishop of Colchester will be in charge of the Diocese".

A Century Ago July 1909

- ♦ CHOIR EXCURSION This was to 'Great White City', for the Imperial International Exhibition. The train, from Ardleigh station, departed at 8.38 and arrived at Liverpool Street at 10.26. [N.B. This journey was faster than the fastest current timetabled journey from Colchester station, which is closer to London].
- ♦ COLCHESTER PAGEANT "has been creating considerable interest in Dedham, and while some of our parishioners have been taking part in it, a large number have witnessed some of the performances." Mr. William Hewitt "very kindly paid for the seats…[for] sixty-four children". The cost of the transport to and from colchester was paid for by the Vicar, Mr. Nathaniel Saunders, the school teachers and three other ladies.
- ♦ VICAR AWAY The Vicar was to be away during most of August; the Rev'd Dr. Caldecott, Professor of Moral Philosophy at King's College, London, would be in residence at the Vicarage as locum.
