



STRANGE DAYS

Whether it's a drought during which it doesn't stop raining, or a sustained economic recession in which the bosses pay themselves much more year-on-year at the same time as making many of their employees redundant, or a coalition Government that appears to make more U-turns than a troupe of Morris dancers, it cannot be denied - these are strange days to be alive in England.

Then, as with the saying about buses, you wait a long time for one, then two great events come along in the same year. The Diamond Jubilee, only the second ever in our nation, gave us cause to reflect on sixty years of the second Elizabethan Age, in which most of us have lived all of our lives, and to consider what we have gained and lost during those years. Hosting the Olympic Games, and being the only country to have done so three times, will encourage us to look beyond ourselves, our difficulties and our aspirations, to include others from around the world. Looking back and around, however, may only seem to confirm what one first thought - that these are strange days.

For most of us it will continue to be the personal and family matters that concern us most. Whether maintaining an income to pay the bills, or caring for family, friends and neighbours, or in dealing with the daily challenges of our own lives, it will be at this level that we measure the days as 'good' or 'bad', 'normal' or 'strange'.



The Bible teaches us to 'number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom' (Psalm 90:12). And yet it is true that whatever we plan for each day, as the book of Proverbs with its ancient wisdom reminds us, we 'do not know what a day may bring forth'. Together this places two fearful truths before us; our certain mortality and the challenge of living daily with a measure of uncertainty. Many people, live as if these truths do not apply to them and then are terribly surprised when, inevitably, they find that they do.

If we accept that, in the providence of God, there will be 'normal days' as well as some 'strange days', then we need fear neither. In Luke's gospel Zechariah, who was living under the yoke of an oppressive regime, put it into the words of a song like this: *Praise be to the Lord, the God of Israel, because he has come to his people and redeemed them... to enable us to serve him without fear in holiness and righteousness before him all our days.*

We learn from the same song that, to rescue us from fear, God chose: *To give his people the knowledge of salvation through the forgiveness of their sins, because of the tender mercy of our God, by which the rising sun will come to us from heaven to shine on those living in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the path of peace.* May we all know God's saving love - especially when living in strange days.

ARDLEIGH SURGERY NEWS

Practice Nurse changes

Following Nurse Practitioner Kate Strowbridge's retirement at the end of March, the practice has appointed a replacement Practice Nurse, Joanne Gordon who started at the surgery on the 10 April. Joanne is an experienced practice nurse and previously worked at a surgery in Colchester. She has taken on the lead responsibility for asthma and COPD care and is a nurse prescriber. Nurse Practitioner Joy Harrison has taken over Kate's lead responsibility for diabetes.

Bereavement

We are sorry to inform patients that one of our long serving receptionists, Jane Roberts, died on the 22 May after a long illness. She will be very much missed by patients and colleagues. Jane joined the practice in 2001 having previously worked at the opticians in Manningtree.

AAA screening

The practice has been approached by Colchester Hospital to provide screening clinics for Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm as part of a national programme. The screening is targeted at men aged 65 and over who are in the highest risk population from suffering a ruptured aortic artery. Male patients of the practice will receive an invitation during the year they turn 65

to attend one of three clinics being held during July and August at the Dedham branch surgery.

Men over 65 who have not been screened previously can arrange a screening appointment by contacting Colchester Hospital directly. Screening involves an ultrasound scan that takes around 10 minutes. The NHS AAA Screening Programme aims to reduce deaths from a ruptured aortic artery amongst men aged 65 and over by up to 50%

DEDHAM GIRLGUIDING

Many thanks to all of you who supported Dedham Girlguiding at the Duck Race which was held on the 5

DEDHAM ENJOYS NATURE

I would like to let you know about the Dedham Enjoys Nature (DEN) site and our plans for this year.

If you haven't had a chance to visit the site, it's well worth a walk round and can be found on the corner of East Lane and Crown Street. The site is owned by Castle House Trust and managed by a group of volunteers. The site is 6 acres of formerly grazed farm land which is made up of six ecosystems - woodland, pond, mixed grasses, wildflower meadow, oak parkland and hedgerow.

Over the next 5 years we are going to slowly bring these ecosystems back to their full potential. We are going to dig out and clay line the pond, grow wild flowers, plant hedgerows and trees and introduce a mobile sheep mowing unit.

DEN is used by Dedham primary school as an environmental education centre, allowing the children to learn about and get involved in nature. It is hoped that other local schools will be able to get involved as well. The richer the site, the more opportunities will be available to the children and our community.

The site relies on volunteers and we always need help. We are holding working parties this year on the following dates:

30 June	22 September
20 October	24 November



All ages are welcome and there are always activities on hand for our young helpers. Work parties run from 9.30am - 11am and all equipment is provided. If those times aren't convenient but you would like to get involved, there are always things we need help with, from strimming to fundraising to sign making! Hymns Old & New No. 128

Despite the first line, this hymn is not a Christian battle-song in the style of *Onward Christian Soldiers* or *Soldiers of Christ arise*. Rather, it is a call to faithfulness. Each of the verses is based on a verse from the Epistles. The first echoes I Timothy 6:12, 'Fight the good fight of faith, lay hold on eternal life'. The second, with its typically Olympic sentiments, follows Hebrews 12: 1, 'Let us run with patience the race that is set before us'.

**Run the straight race through God's good grace
Lift up thine eyes and seek his face;
Life with its way before thee lies
Christ is the path and Christ the prize.**

The third verse is from I Peter 5:7, 'Casting all your care on him, for he cares for you'; and the fourth from Colossians 3: 11, 'Christ is all, in all'.

This hymn, which first appeared in 1863, was written by John S.B. Monsell (1811-75), who was born in Ireland and became the vicar of Egham, Surrey, before moving in 1870 to Guildford. He was supervising work to the roof of St. Nicholas parish church there, when he slipped and fell, sustaining injuries from which he died shortly afterwards.

Monsell published more than 300 hymns of which this and 'O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness' are the only ones regularly sung today. He believed that hymns should be enthusiastically sung and full of joy. 'We are too distant and reserved in our praises' he wrote. This hymn is sung to a variety of tunes, the most common of which is DUKE STREET, which is generally attributed to John Hatton (?-1793) a native of St. Helen's, Lancashire.

Essex Castle Bike Ride
