'He gave us eyes to see them' JOACHIM AND ANNE SCULPTURE

July 26 is the feast day of Joachim and Anne, the parents of Mary, the mother of Jesus. We know about this couple through tradition and an apocryphal gospel of St James from the 2nd century A.D. which describes the sadness of Anne and Joachim in their childlessness. The gospel tells how Anne sees a nest of sparrows in a laurel tree and cries out to God to hear her prayer for a child. An angel informs each of them that God



has blessed their union and that their unborn child Joachim and Anne sculpture will be the mother of the Saviour.


The moment when Joachim learns of his wife's pregnancy is expressed in this month's carving – a wondrous little sculpture in oak from the fifteenth-century by an anonymous artist. It is that moment in the gospel of St James when Anne and Joachim fall into each other's arms in front of the Golden Gate in Jerusalem. Joachim is embracing and kissing his wife with joy and with relief that after so many years of childlessness, Anne is finally pregnant.

Our initial instinct is to reach out and touch such beauty in the carving. We want to feel the lines and contours of the piece, and to feel the emotions beneath the surface conveyed so eloquently in wood. A piece of oak and the skill of a carver have worked together here to produce what is believed to have been part of an altarpiece for a church of our Lady. As we look and ponder, we rejoice that in the lives of Anne and Joachim God has shown us that he is faithful and has kept covenant with his people for all generations. From the time of Adam and Eve through Abraham and Sarah, Anne and Joachim, Mary and Joseph, the marriage covenant comes to perfect fulfilment in the new and eternal covenant when Christ the Bridegroom takes to his heart and life the Church, his Bride. As we focus on the intimate moment in the lives of these two holy ones in the carving, we give thanks for the timeless truth expressed in their fruitfulness - that God planned from the beginning to send his Son, born of a woman, to be the light and salvation for all people.

CONSTABLE COUNTRY MEDICAL

New Telephone system

A new single telephone system at East Bergholt will replace the current independent systems at Capel and East Bergholt. Patients will still be able to phone the same numbers 01473 310 203 for Capel and 01206 298 272 for East Bergholt) but all calls will be routed to East Bergholt. Additional receptionist will be hired to assist at peak times. The changes will result in a much more efficient system for handling calls from patients and is intended to address some of the problems patients have experienced in contacting the practice at busy times. We anticipate the new system being operational by the beginning of August.

New Doctors

Several new staff will be joining the practice – Dr Olowu will be joining the practice as a full time partner and Dr Tetteh, currently a salaried GP, will also become a full time partner, both from I September. Dr Rufford will join the practice as a salaried GP from June. In addition, two GP registrars will be joining the practice in August. These are fully-qualified doctors, registered with the GMC, who are undergoing three further years of training in primary care to become GPs.

Just a reminder that the practice will be closed from 1pm on 25 June for staff training.

Cllr. Sheila Beeton writes:

Will you be the eyes and ears of the village?

The new parking strategy has now been implemented, resulting in a number of beneficial outcomes. The car park is greatly improved with a revised layout, clearly delineated spaces allowing parking for more vehicles and increased lighting. Full credit must be given to our local businesses who have been using their new parking permits leaving Royal Square free for short term usage and making the village look far less cluttered.

Not all the news is good however. Regrettably we must inform you that the car parking meters have been mindlessly vandalised seven times since being installed invoking repair costs which now amount to some two thousand pounds.

These costs will necessarily be met from public funds to which we all contribute and which should be spent for the public good. Dedham Parish Council will have to meet 50% of these costs which will inevitably affect our ability to deliver local services to the standards we would wish. There is even a risk, should this vandalism continue, that car park charges which we have deliberately tried to keep low, will have to rise to help fund the repairs.

Criminal damage of this nature is a serious crime and Essex police, who are presently pursuing enquiries, want to emphasise that the penalty on

prosecution for such vandalism can be 3-6 months in prison, depending on severity. The policy of the police in such cases is to recommend that the court give the maximum sanctions.

Criminal acts of vandalism inevitably affect and diminish the community of Dedham. Let's fight it together!

We are asking you all to be vigilant. Have you seen anything suspicious in or around the car park? See it. Hear it. Report it at the time! Please remember details are everything. Car registration numbers and a personal description together with an early report are vital.

Ten Years Ago July 2004

So the idea took shape; and the Royal Blue Thorneycroft, which is quite the last word in this line, and has only been on the road a month, has been engaged to take us to Cambridge and back. But this way of travelling is much more costly than by rail. However... Mr Hewitt has promised substantially to increase his usual subscription towards the Choir excursion...

To make up the party the Bell ringers and Sidesmen have been invited, so that probably about twenty-four of us will be making this expedition on July 7th. There happens to be a full moon that night, so that if the weather is fine, we ought to have a pleasant journey both there and back.
