

'He gave us eyes to see them'

#### MASTER OF ALKMAAR'S SEVEN WORKS OF MERCY The number seven has always been

regarded as a sacred or mystical number. This month we focus on the seven acts of mercy depicted in panels painted by the Master of Alkmaar in 1504. This work was originally commissioned by the Holy Spirit Brotherhood of St Laurence's church in Alkmaar. The panels were badly damaged in the

iconoclasm of 1566, but they survived and have been restored to show the power of their message.

The background to each of the panels is a typical city, and so at the very least it is a wonderful impression of Dutch life at the beginning of the 16<sup>th</sup> century. But the pervasive theme is to show how we can live a good life by practising the seven acts of mercy. In chapter 25 of St. Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells the Parable of the Sheep and Goats. He has already told his listeners to be ready and awake like the ten bridesmaids and to use our gifts and talents wisely. Now he stresses that the faithful disciple who feeds the hungry, gives a drink to the thirsty, welcomes the stranger, clothes the naked, cares for the sick or visits the prisoner is not only serving those in need around, but serves Jesus himself. To those six acts the medieval tradition added burying the dead, and that is the theme of the central panel where Jesus is shown depicted in the sky above on the Day of Judgement.

In the other acts of mercy, Jesus is there among the people. With the panel showing the feeding of the hungry, we see a couple handing out bread from a basket to those around. Jesus is behind the man giving out the loaves his wife has baked, looking on at this act of goodness. We who stand in front of the panel are reminded that in serving others, we also serve Christ. Follow these examples in the seven panels, the artist is saying, and you will be a faithful disciple. To drive that crucial point home, the inscription below says that good deeds on earth will be repaid a thousand-fold in heaven.

#### WHAT A JOY!

More than 150 people visited the exhibition of the artwork of my late wife, Margarita, in the ten hours that it was open. A total of just under £600 was raised through the sale of the postcards of her artwork which, after paying for the cost of printing the cards and the exhibition catalogues, means that £150 each will be given to both *Christian* Aid and the charity *CoHoC*, for the work of the Out-Patients Dept. at the Colchester General Hospital.

Of the 25 works of textile art on display, one of the favourites (to judge by visitors' comments) was Seascape - Norfolk, which had been inspired by a family visit to Holkham beach in Norfolk. There is something wonderfully simple

and wonder in the glory of God that Margarita had, as you take time with your family or friends in what are now called *holidays* but were once known as *holy-days* - being a time when we can set aside our daily cares to reflect, read, and to pray;

about the kind of refreshment we can get by spending some time by the sea. A sense of scale may be restored and we can sense something of an eternal rhythm beyond all our small concerns.

After I had written the catalogue to accompany the *Threads of Joy* exhibition I discovered some notes written by Margarita about her art. They confirm that it was her response to the glory of God as seen in in the natural world, in a particular place or an ephemeral moment, that inspired her. She wrote:

to be with those whom we love and to be able to review our priorities and consider afresh our plans for whatever future, by God's grace, is to be ours.

For the first time in many years, with the kind support of my colleague Paul Southern, this Summer I shall be able to do what I am commending to you that is to take time to enjoy holy-days in this way.



## **DEDHAM CHURCHYARD**

'Private grief in a public place'

As part of the regular maintenance of our church burial grounds, the groundsman has been instructed to remove the following from graves:

memorials and shrubs placed without permission

- flower containers or tributes that are not made of stone: including those made of plastic, glass, china, porcelain, terracotta or cloth material
- $\Box$  wire, nylon or plastic netting
- $\square$  artificial flowers
- $\Box$  grave borders of wood or metal
- $\Box$  and, after about a year, all earth mounds or extensions beyond the footprint of an authorised memorial.

Small tokens placed at the foot of a memorial stone may be left for a short while (for example, to mark special anniversaries) but these may not be placed permanently; in due course they will be removed and without further notice.

Whereas some leeway is given to those who have been recently bereaved, after a year all memorials and tributes must be within Diocese of Chelmsford regulations, see:

**DEDHAM C.E. PRIMARY SCHOOL** At the end of May, I had the privilege of visiting our partner school, Gatunduri Primary, in Embu, Kenya. The partnership began four years ago and since then three reciprocal visits have taken place.

'Connecting Classrooms' is a global education project funded by the British Council and is designed to help young people to learn about global issues and to become responsible global citizens. The partnerships enable educators to share best practice and give young people the chance to collaborate with their international peers on curriculum -based activities.

Over the past few years we have collaborated on: developing areas for growing food, producing artwork, developing 'forest' areas, sharing curriculum topics and learning about each other's daily lives.

Little could prepare me for the incredible nine days that I was to spend in Kenya. Yes, the classrooms have mud walls and floors, yes, the toilets are holes in the ground, yes, there are

children who are sent to school with no food because their parents can't afford to buy any, and yes, there are few resources in the classrooms. However, the joy in those children's faces, the dedication they demonstrate to learning and achieving in life and the appreciation that they have for so little will live with me forever.

There are twenty classes and around 850 children in total at the school. I worked on hand-eye coordination and the numbers 0-10 with the 'baby' class and it was singing and story-telling with the older classes and they were delighted to receive some percussion instruments to accompany their wonderful singing. The children also taught me some songs which I will be teaching to the Dedham children during hymn practices.

It is difficult to sum up the week and my experiences in so few words but I hope to develop an area on our school website over the coming months so that more correspondence can be shared between the schools with children, parents and the community.


#### ST HELENA HOSPICE CYCLE RIDE



The Vicar is anxious to form a complete list of all those who have left this parish to join the colours, and to serve abroad or in home defence. [Of the fifteen names listed as known to the Vicar, published in Sept. 1914, only two were eventually to be listed on the War Memorial.]
