Hymns Old & New No. 534

Matthias Claudius

This much-loved harvest hymn seems to have come from the very depths of the English countryside, so it would be no surprise to learn that it had been written by someone in Constable Country. In fact, it is a translation from a German original, written by Matthias Claudius (1740-1815), who was born in Lübeck, the son of a Lutheran pastor. Claudius became a journalist and was a friend of the poet Goethe. After a period of professed atheism, Claudius renewed his Christian faith.

His harvest hymn first appeared in a play he wrote in 1782, about a harvest celebration in a North German village. It was closely based on a peasants' song he had heard sung by one of the farmers. The original ran to seventeen four-line verses, with a refrain to each, but when the hymn was published in 1800 it had been shortened to six verses with a chorus.

This shortened version was translated into English in 1861 by Jane Montgomery Campbell (1817-78), the daughter of the vicar of St. James', Paddington, who taught music in schools in Devon. The usual tune, WIR PFLUGEN, or DRESDEN, is attributed to J.A.P. Schultz (1747-1800), who was *Kapelmeister* to Prince Henry of Prussia.

One modern, untraceable, revision of this hymn has the lines:

We plough the fields with tractors, With drills we sow the land

and

We add our fertilizers To help the growing grain

which is so not far removed from John Betjeman's deliberate parody:

We spray the fields and scatter The poison on the ground

Nowadays English harvest celebrations seem incomplete without hearing the traditional version sung at least once.

OUR TURN

Exactly a hundred years ago our church celebrated the re-opening of the chancel, which had been closed for seven months (see p.8). It falls to us, a century later, to tackle a significant refurbishment of the same area. In these tough economic times there will be reasonable questions asked, such as 'Why this project?' and 'Why now?'

For an answer to the first question, please see the next page. As to the second question; this is a good time to employ local craftsmen, some of whom have looked after our church building for a long time. One man said that he first worked here over fifty years ago!

over fifty years ago! Some major work has already been done this year: part of the old churchyard has been cleared, for re-use when the extension churchyard is full; failed exterior render has been replaced at the chancel end; and 40-year-old heating units in church have been replaced. This work was made possible through a legacy from the late Mrs. Kate Angell of Frinton, and through the generous support of the Friends of Dedham Church.

The next phase of the work will also be largely met from that legacy and with some further help from the *Friends*. Yet there will need to be some additional giving if we are to complete the re-lighting scheme we began in 2007, and the repairs to the exterior and interior of the nave, which we began this year.

Nearly twenty years ago this



community was very generous in its support of the major repairs to the church tower. It was helpful to be able to link this with a celebration of the 500 years since the present building was begun, the 'Quincentenary Appeal'.

> We have no anniversaries with which to connect this project (unless you know of any?), so it will be the responsibility of our community to give in a grateful and generous way, and also encourage others to do likewise, simply because it is 'our turn' in 09/10 to tackle these tasks. As part of the process of applying for permission to re-order the Chancel, the PCC has prepared a 'Statement of Needs'. Here is a shortened version of it:

STATEMENT OF NEEDS



LIGHTING The 1960s lighting is inadequate and inaccessible. The lamps once used for the high-level fitments are obsolete. Modern lamps fit incorrectly, overheat, and last only a short time. Access to them is now only permitted by use of a tower platform or scaffolding which is difficult to use because of varying floor levels and fixed furniture. Fluorescent lamps in the windows are difficult to replace and give poor lighting for reading. A replacement lighting scheme must improve specific and context lighting within the chancel and sanctuary, and be easier and cheaper to use and maintain.

WOODWORK The early 20th-century choir stalls have extensive deathwatch beetle infestation. The oak has darkened unevenly by use and is in need of careful restoration to regain its original vitality. The fixed furniture means that safe access to some of the lighting is impossible without tower platforms or scaffolding. The sanctuary rail has become damaged through use and is in need of restoration. We want a way of making the front row of choir pews and the book stands moveable to permit easier access to maintaining the lighting. Infested wood must be removed and replaced with oak to match the original design. Choir pews should be restored to their original, lighter and warmer, colouring. The sanctuary rail should be restored and, if possible, made moveable to improve access to the area.

CHANCEL DOOR This door was damaged by an attempted forced entry some years ago and is poorly fitting. The extent of glass causes convection down-drafts, particularly in winter. The chancel door should be repaired. A scheme for electric pew heating should be designed. This would make it possible to use this area for smaller congregations and without the use of the main heating.

PAINTING In the 1960s refurbishment white emulsion paint was used on the walls when it should have been lime-wash. This has resulted in efflorescence and poor stability of the wall surfaces. We want the walls restored to their former condition of lime-wash on lime plaster and all unstable surfaces to be made good.

CONCLUSION At present the chancel and sanctuary in our church is gloomy, cold, beetle-infested, dowdy, and gives all the appearance of being of secondary importance within our fine building. We want the chancel and sanctuary to be restored so that it regains its significance within the life and worship of our church.

John Osborn writes HELPED BY A DEDHAM TRUST

The Dedham Branch Surgery has now been operational for three months and regularly available, apart from some expected closures due to GP absence for holidays. The service has been well received by patients and has successfully merged with the Ardleigh practice. Some work on sound-proofing a consulting room will be carried out in the coming weeks, but this should not seriously affect the delivery of services on the four days when surgeries are held.

The Dedham Relief in Sickness Trust has played an important Thank. part in the restoration of a medical presence in Dedham. It would be accurate to state that the provision of medical facilities not previously available and in an area close to where people live is a most appropriate example of 'relief in certain areas of expenditure were sickness'. When the trustees of that charity decided to grant some working capital to the directors of the Dedham Vale Community Health Association, in early2008, that they might continue their quest for a surgery in the Roman Place premises the prospect of a GP surgery seemed remote. Emphasis was then on the need to find other uses within the NHS. Because of that grant the DVCHA was able to ensure the premises would continue to be available for immediate use should suitable health-related users emerge.

The Dedham Vale Network began their provision of health, support and therapy choices in November 2008. Then the approach from the Ardleigh GP practice in January 2009 led to the commencement of NHS patient care in Dedham from July, after a gap of six years. The confidence of the trustees of the Relief in Sickness Trust was not been misplaced. That funding gave the DVCHA time and boosted the spirit of those engaged in the search, who refused to accept what to many seemed inevitable, that Dedham would never again have a GP surgery.

Even when the positive decision was made, it was still necessary to find additional funds for the cost of the preparing Roman Place surgery so that it would be a full part of the main Ardleigh practice. Some of this was paid by the NHS, but outside of their remit. The Trustees of the Relief in Sickness Trust made a further significant grant for these costs.

In the knowledge that funds were available the Ardleigh practice and DVCHA were able to furnish the premises commensurate with the excellent standard of patient care for which the practice is known. On behalf of all of those who do and will benefit from the Dedham surgery, our sincere thanks to the Relief in Sickness Trust for those most enlightened grants.

Fifty Years Ago October 1959

♦ DISTURBING INCIDENT 'There was...a disturbing incident after the Family Service [3.15 p.m. on 1st Sunday in month], when so many people, after lining up outside the church, pushed their way into church before the congregation had time to leave their pews, much less look round the church...'

A Century Ago October 1909

RE-OPENING OF THE CHANCEL The Bishop of St. Albans 'visited Dedham and re-opened the Chancel, which had been closed for seven months...all that has been done...whole of the lead on the roofs of the Chancel, Nave, and South Aisle, including the South Porch...having been re-cast on the spot...lengths of deal have been laid crosswise over the original rafters of the North and South Aisle...increasing the warmth of the Church...let us hope [this] will prevent the bats from burrowing underneath...the Chancel roof [was] strengthened with two double tie rods, the battlements on the south wall have been restored to correspond with those on the north side...the four closed windows have been opened and filled with stained glass. Inside, the Chancel has been enriched with a black and white marbled pavement, of bold and effective design, and carved oak altar rails have been substituted in place of the old ones. The steps leading to the Sacrarium have also been moved forward eleven inches, so that the communicants should be on the same level as the celebrant. As the opening of these windows will [make] the Chancel colder, a gas radiator...has been placed over against the north wall. At the west end a structural improvement has been carried out by the removal of the unsightly screen, which was left there when the organ was removed to its present position, and which blocked out the handsome arch opening on to the west door... the restoration...was undertaken by Mr. W.W. Hewitt and his sister, as a memorial to their brother, the late Mr. James Hewitt; and the other improvements were made possible by the legacy left by...the late Miss Eyre. The stained glass windows are the gifts of other friends...[detailed].
