

SONGS OF PRAISE

Take my life, and let it be Consecrated, Lord, to thee; Take my moments, and my days, Let them flow in ceaseless praise





Frances R. Havergal

This hymn has long been sung at Confirmation or Ordination services, where a commitment is being made to the Christian life. Frances Ridley Havergal (1836-79) was born in Astley, Worcestershire, where her father was the rector. She wrote her first hymn when aged 7. She led a classic Victorian life of good works and piety, but she did not enjoy strong health.

Her output of hymns was considerable, including; *I am trusting Thee, Lord Jesus*, and *Who is on the Lord's side?* The hymn *Take my life* was written by Havergal at the end of her five-day visit to a friend's house. She later described how there had been ten people in the house, 'some uncoverted and long prayed-for, some converted but not rejoicing Christians' and she wrote that God gave her a prayer, '"Lord, give me all in this house" And He just did.' In that sense this is properly a Harvest hymn; not just of marrows and fruit, or unwanted tins, but far more importantly of people's lives for Christ.

Havergal expected her hymn to be sung to her father's tune PATMOS which was written for this hymn, later known as CONSECRATION.

W.H. Havergal (1793-1870) was a notable church musician. Down the years, however, it has been sung to many tunes, among them ST. BEES, written by J. B. Dykes (1823-76), VIENNA by J.H. Knecht (1752-1817), INNOCENTS, a melody of unknown origin which was arranged by W.H. Monk (1823-69), and a tune called NOTTINGHAM, often thought to have been written by Mozart but in fact by Jeremiah Clarke (1670-1707), he of the 'Trumpet Voluntary' so often chosen for weddings.

The fourth verse is certainly among the most challenging ever written:

Take my silver and my gold, Not a mite would I withhold. Take my intellect, and use Every power as Thou shalt choose.

ARDLEIGH SURGERY

We would like to know how we can improve our service to our patients and how patients perceive our surgery and staff. BERGHOLT SURGERY

The 'flu vaccination is available free of charge to those meeting the criteria. If you have not received a letter or have queries about your eligibility please contact the surgery for advice.

The surgery apologies if patients have found difficultly in reaching the practice by telephone. Recent staff shortages and illness have meant that we have not had the normal level of reception cover over the last month. We are looking to resolve this issue as soon a possible. The telephones are very busy first thing in the morning. We would be grateful if patients needing to contact the surgery for routine issues and advance appointments could do so after II a.m.

The practice is offering free health to assess the risk of developing heart disease, stroke, kidney disease or diabetes. If there are warning signs, advice can be given and action taken to improve your health and prevent the onset of these conditions. The health check is open to those patients aged 40-74 who have not already been diagnosed with the above conditions. It involves a simple blood test followed by a consultation about a week later with one or our specially trained nurses (Lesley or Anthea) which lasts 15-30 minutes. Please ring us to book your blood test and follow up appointment.

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

'ME' AND 'WE'

My mother has always done it for me. For many years so have several Dedham church members. I am very grateful to them for taking time to read far wider than I can and, when they see something they think would be of interest to me, keeping a cutting or copy of it for me to read.

The Chief Rabbi, Jonathan Sacks, is a particularly thoughtful writer. He has

touched my 'honorary researchers' to draw attention to what he has written many times. Recently he was reflecting on the tenth anniversary of '9/11', in the context of the hard news that has gripped the West since. He listed:

"...the disintegration of the family, the build-up of personal debt, the collapse of financial institutions, the downgrading of the American economy, the continuing failure of some European economies, the loss of a sense of honour, loyalty and integrity that has brought once esteeemed groups into disrepute, the waning throughout the West of a sense of national identity; even the [recent] riots.'

Lord Sacks saw all these things as signs of the hardening of the arteries of our culture, of a civilisation that had grown old. With the candour of a consultant doctor speaking to a patient who had refused to change their bad habits and guard their health, he gives his diagnosis:

"Whenever Me takes precedence over We, and pleasure today over viability tomorrow, a society is in trouble."

> Yet it is not enough simply to point to a bad situation. To do so would be like pointing to a beggar in the street and saying "Look!" We must also consider how such a bad situation may be improved. This is what the

great William Wilberforce did with regard to the British involvement in the slave trade (I have just finished reading a superb biography of him).

For Lord Sacks the 'treatment' is clear: "The only way to save the world is to begin with ourselves. Our burden after 9/11 is to renew the moral disciplines of freedom."





Roy Laverick writes

HALLFIELDS FARM SITE

The disused farm buildings and yard of Hallfields Farm are located close to the junction of Manningtree Road and Crown Street. The area has been the subject of potential development plans for several years. A recent outline Planning Application offered the possibility of the site being developed with a number of relatively small houses, which would only be offered to purchasers who had previously lived or worked in Dedham for at least two years.

If adopted, these provisions would have gone some way towards meeting the desperate shortage of smaller houses in the village, which are much needed by first-time buyers and those wishing to downsize in later life. The proposals were therefore supported by the Parish Council, and by several other bodies and individuals, who saw this as an important step towards ensuring the continued development of the village as a balanced community.

Against this backdrop we were sorry that the Planning Committee of Colchester Borough Council saw fit to reject the application out of hand. This, and other less crucial decisions, which fly in the face of the clearly stated preferences of many residents, cause us to question the value of Government-inspired consultative exercises (such as our Village Design

Statement or the more recent Parish Plan) which have been completed at the cost of many hundreds of hours of voluntary work. We await developments with interest.

The next Parish Council meeting will be at **7.30 pm** on **Wednesday 12 October** in the Assembly Rooms.

PAST TIMES

Ten Years Ago October 2001

♦ VANDALISM The children's play area in the Recreation Ground [has been] seriously vandalised. The tower and slide, which comprised the biggest single item of play equipment in the area, was set on fire and subsequently damaged beyond any possibility of repair. As a result the whole area had to be temporarily closed off prior to inspection and clearance work. For the people of Dedham this act of wanton vandalism will cause, perhaps permanently, a significant amenity loss. It is hoped that the large space vacated by the combination unit will be filled by an equally popular piece of equipment — ideally a similar item — but this will depend upon sufficient funds being made available and other funding priorities being met.

Fifty Years Ago October 1961

- ♦ HARVEST GIFT DAY 'At the end of this month I propose to sit in the Church porch once again from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Between now and then you will receive a letter from me about this and I do hope you will support our Gift Day.
- ♦ UNIVERSITY OF ESSEX 'We in Colchester are naturally delighted that the location of the University is to be in Colchester. That Chelmsford should be our County and Cathedral town, and Colchester the Garrison and University town is surely an equable division of labour and honour. What needs emphasising in any town to which a new University is coming is the challenge which it will present. Unless the University can be integrated into the life of the Community, the choice of site will inevitably be deplored.
- ♦ DEDHAM, MASACUSSETTS 'The Town celebrated its 325th Annivesary during the middle of September. We sent a cablegram congratulating them and have had a warm reply.

A Century Ago October 1911

♦ DEDHAM STREET LIGHTING 'We are very sorry that the Dedham Street Lighting Fund does not meet with the support that it deserves. The object of the fund is that the street shall be lighted during the winter months: that is, from Michaelmas to Lady Day. Dour years ago this was decided upon, and at some initial expense the existing lamps were got into order and others added. Since then the [High] Street has been regularly lighted...and the management of the fund has been in the hands of Mr. Percy Clover. We believe that he has had some difficulty in collecting the subscriptions, while other have dropped off and the deficit is now... £8 5s 1d.'
