

## **PARISH COUNCIL**

Cllr. Kevin Taylor writes

### Superfast Broadband

Dedham councillors have met with Connie Kerbst, senior programme manager for Superfast. We asked for the meeting because we felt that both the information being published by ECC and the communications with the Parish council needed to be improved. The main information portal for the progress of the project is

www.superfastessex.org through which residents can enter their post code and check on when, or if, they are going to benefit from the plans. Connie has provided us with a map that gives an indication of the proposals for the village; you may see this on the Dedham Parish Briefing on Superfast Essex Programme on the Parish website.

A complex evaluation process was carried out to ensure that the funds available cover as many homes across Essex as possible.

In summary the upgrade is broadly split into three areas:

- Autumn 2014 will see an area from Brook Street going out of the village centre via Castle Hill to Long Road, taking in Manningtree Road, half of East Lane and Coopers Lane.
- 2015 will see progress from Brook Street, through the village centre and up towards Lamb Corner, taking in Stratford Road and Coles Oak Lane.
- The remaining area has no current plans for upgrading. It is understood that more funding is to be made available and further coverage is

expected across Essex after another evaluation exercise. If you live in an area with no current plans, it is essential that you visit the Superfast Essex site and complete the Make the Connection survey.

Please note although the coverage map is drawn to postcodes some people may get coverage outside of this map. I must caution you that presently these are plans and not certainties. We are currently pressing for regular progress updates.

## Ten Years Ago October 2004

- ♦ SALE OF HEWITT COTTAGE The former caretaker's cottage alongside the Assembly Rooms, which was built in the mid-1920s, was sold at a public auction by Roy Chapman. The funds raised were invested for the benefit of the Assembly Rooms.
- ♦ DEDHAM LECTURE POSTPONED The historian, naturalist and quiz-master Magnus Magnusson K.B.E. was too ill to give the lecture as planned. [He was able to give the lecture in the following year].

## Fifty Years Ago October 1964

- ♦ VICAR, LECTURER, RURAL DEAN AND CANON OF THE CATHEDRAL The Revd A.R. ('Johnny') Johnston was, after 14 years in the parish, invited to become also a Canon of Chelmsford Cathedral [a form of recognition by the diocese of the considerable success of his ministry here].
- NORTH PORCH RESTORATION Scheduled work to restore the North Porch was postponed until February 1965, when it was expected to last two months.

## A Century Ago October 1914

- ♦ SUPPORT FOR THE TROOPS Queen Mary's appeal for 300,000 socks and belts for the soldiers was reported and from Dedham it was hoped to be able to send three dozen of each. There was also appeals for clothes for the thousands of Belgian refugees arriving in England; for warm woollen articles for men working on minesweepers in the North Sea and from the Red Cross for shirts, socks and pyjamas for use in the hospitals in France.
- ♦ HOSPITAL IN DEDHAM Miss Mounsey, Commandant of the Red Cross detachment in Dedham, reported that she would be able to make the Memorial Hall seviceable as a hospital, for the reception of any wounded sent to Dedham, at a few hours notice.
