GOD IN THE ARTS

He gave us eyes to see them': 'Still Life with Lemons, Oranges and a Rose'

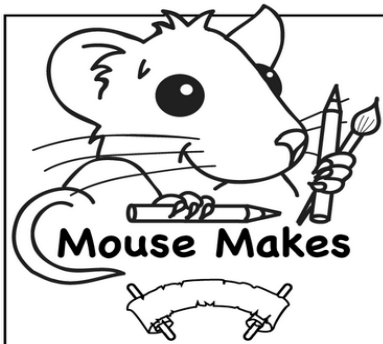


When I was a schoolboy, I would often serve the weekday eucharist in my parish church. It was an early morning celebration with a handful of worshippers there: a great contrast to the bustle and liveliness of Sunday services. Instead, a quiet time to focus on the gifts of bread and wine offered on the altar. This month's painting of 1633 is an opportunity to focus on the gifts that have been offered at the altar of this table in 'Still Life with Lemons, Oranges and a Rose' by Francisco Zurbarán. He was a contemporary of the more famous Velázquez and worked in Seville until his death in 1664.

There is something quite special and evocative in the arrangement of fruits and flowers – two highly polished plates, one bearing the citrons (not lemons as the title tells us), the other a cup of water and a rose. In the centre there is a basket with oranges and orange blossom. Against the dark background we sense the cool tones of the plates and cup, and the warmth of fruits and flowers.

There is a curious balance and poise here, and some critics have suggested a Trinitarian allusion in the three groups so deliberately placed on the table. Others have pointed to the rose and water as symbols of our Lady, and the fruit and blossom as signs of the new life of Easter. A devout Spanish Catholic in the 17th century would have noticed these allusions, but they may be too fanciful as X-rays have shown that Zurbarán painted out another plate which simply contained sweet candied potatoes.

What he has portrayed is an allegory of the senses. We can almost smell the fragrance of orange blossom and the tanginess of the fruits. We want to reach out to touch and taste. But no, we must look and ponder the offering of these gifts for our delight, and give thanks for the artist who has shown us something of the sacramental beauty of creation in them.

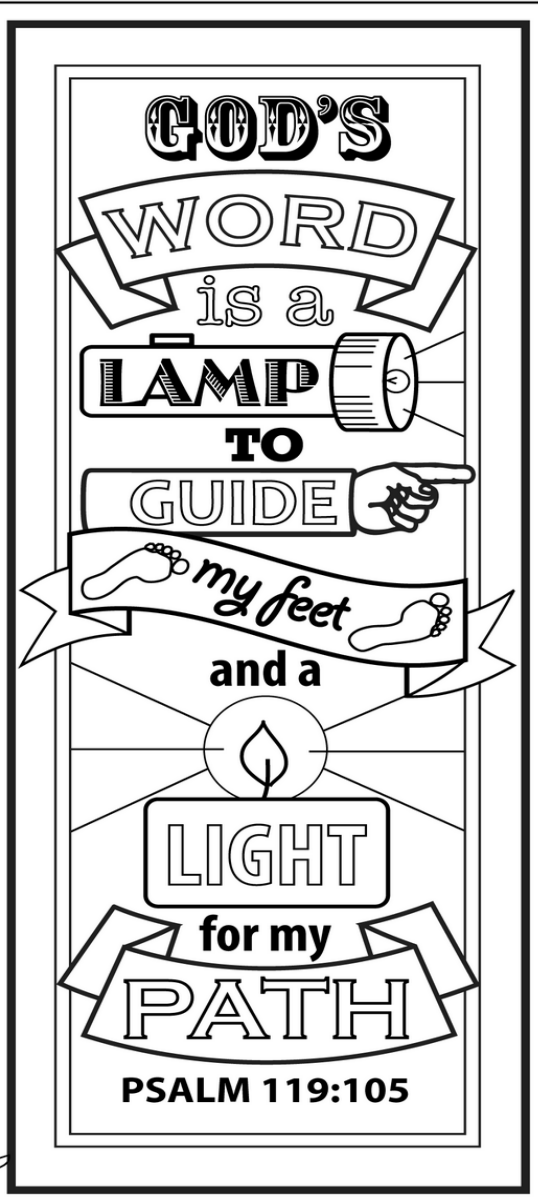

David Druitt writes

REPLACING THE VICAR & LECTURER

As many of you will be aware, the Dedham Ecclesiastical Lectureship Trust (*The Trust*) are, along with the Duchy Of Lancaster, the patrons of the living in Dedham and following Gerard's departure in January The Trust assumed this role on the alternate basis.

The Trustees feel it is important that Parishioners understand what has been happening since January and also what is going to happen in the next few months regarding the vacancy we have for a Vicar & Lecturer.

In late April The Trust and the PCC received a letter from the Bishop of Colchester advising us that the Colchester Area Mission & Pastoral Committee were going to recommend to the Bishop of Chelmsford that the "rights of presentation" that The Trust has, as patron, to present a candidate(s) to the PCC to be the next incumbent, be suspended for a period of 5 years with the right to renew this suspension for further periods if deemed necessary.

Suspension is a legal device that is used when the Deanery that we are part of, have identified a local need for some sort of pastoral re-organisation of parishes. This should be on the back of a clear and published Deanery plan, which we understand is in the process

of being produced, but we have not seen a copy of the plan as yet.

The Trust has taken advice regarding the legality of the proposed suspension and has written to the Bishop of Colchester outlining our concerns about it and proposing a possible way ahead which will be discussed with the Bishop and other Diocesan staff at a meeting which is being held on the 1st October.

The Trust does however have an obligation under its Governing document to appoint a suitably qualified communicant member of the Church of England to the office of Lecturer during any period when there is no Vicar or Priest-in-Charge of Dedham and we have advised the Bishop that we will do this if we do not make satisfactory progress on a replacement Vicar & Lecturer.

I would plan to provide further updates on the progress we are making in future editions of the Parish Magazine, but in the meantime please do not hesitate to contact either myself or either of the Church Wardens, Richard Hopkins and Quinlan Terry, if there are any matters relating to this topic that you would like to discuss.

STRATEGIC DEVELOPMENT

Colchester Borough Council is in the process of developing their new 'Local Plan' which will be of critical importance in controlling building development across the Borough.

As part of this process CBC has issued a 'call for sites' inviting interested landowners to put forward land which may be suitable for development.

Four sites have been put forward in Dedham – all of them around Dedham Heath. Details are available on the CBC website. The Parish Council has approved a set of assessment criteria for the evaluation of named sites and will be agreeing a formal response to CBC on the proposed sites at the October meeting. The assessment criteria are available on the DPC website.
