

Hymns Old & New No. 516

Nahum Tate

Not all hymn-writers were, or are, heroic or saintly people. The writer of this hymn, often sung at times of Remembrance, was certainly no hero. Naham Tate (1652-1715) was born in Dublin, the son of a clergyman with the somewhat embarassing name of 'Faithful Teate'. Changing his surname was only one sign of Tate distancing himself from his background. He moved to London, where he aspired to be a professional poet, much like a song-writer today, meanwhile making a living by translating French and Latin texts for publishers. He wrote a cautionary treatise on *Syphilis*, which he called 'the French Disease' (while they probably thought of it as 'La Malade Anglais').

As well as poems, he wrote some feeble plays, and altered the works of established dramatists, including Shakespeare. He gave *King Lear* a happy ending by allowing Cordelia to escape death and marry Edgar, and re-worked *Romeo and Juliet* to similar effect. He was given the honour of being Poet Laureate, in 1692. Yet Tate was denied a happy ending to his own life, as he had provided so often for fictional characters. His poetry was later criticized by Alexander Pope in *The Dunciad*, and Tate is thought by some to have been the weakest Laureate of a rather poor series. Tate's alcoholism paved the way so that he eventually died while sheltering in a debtors' refuge within the precincts of the Royal Mint, in 1715.

Tate is best-known for his metrical version of the Psalms on which he collaborated with his fellow Irishman Nicholas Brady. This hymn, a paraphrase of Psalm 34, was first published in 1696. There was originally 18 verses, but no hymn book has ever printed it in full.

The tune WILTSHIRE, to which this hymn is usually sung, was written by Sir George Smart (1776-1867), when he was only 19 years old, although he originally wrote the tune for Psalm 18. Some Free Presbyterian congregations in Scotland use the same tune for several other Psalms, including Psalm 23.

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

NINETY YEARS ON

Early in 1919 a public meeting was held in Dedham to discuss 'a memorial for those belonging to this parish who have fallen in the War', at which the siting of it in Royal Square was agreed, and a committee formed to raise the money and to recommend what form the memorial should take.

In October 1919 the last name was added to the 'already long list... who gave their lives in the service of their country'. Alfred lames Bird, who had worked for Austin's wine merchants in the High Street before the War, and was 40 years old when he enlisted in 1917, died in Colchester of a cerebral fever he had contracted while fighting in France.



In September 1920 it was reported that the memorial architect. William D. Caröe, had

been advised by the contractors, Messrs. Clary and Wright, of Ipswich, that they hoped to have the memorial erected by the end of October.

In November the committee announced the agreed inscriptions, but also that a delay 'in the carving of the figures', meant it was 'quite uncertain... when the work will be completed'. On the north side, facing Mill Lane, would be the words:

> IN HONOUR OF DEDHAM MEN WHO DIED IN THE SERVICE OF THEIR COUNTRY AND IN THE CAUSE OF RIGHT AND FREEDOM 1914-1918

Facing east and west would be the thirty-two names, in four columns of eight. On the south side (later, after World War II, moved to the north side), would be words chosen by Canon Gerald Rendall (see below).

The author was Thomas Phineas James, captain of the vessel Henrietta Maria, sent out in 1631 by some Bristol merchants to discover the North -West passage. The ship was caught in the ice, and he and his crew passed a winter of terrible suffering. On taking his leave of the dead, he wrote an Epitaph on Companions left behind in the Northern Seas, from which these words are taken.

WE THAT SURVIVE, PERCHANCE MAY END OUR DAYS IN SOME EMPLOYMENT MERITING NO PRAISE: THEY HAVE OUTLIVED THIS FEAR, AND THEIR BRAVE ENDS WILL EVER BE AN HONOUR TO THEIR FRIENDS.



It is thought by some that Thomas' poem, and his subsequent account of the voyage, The Strange and Dangerous Voyage of Captaine Thomas James, published in 1633, was the inspiration for Samuel Taylor Coleridge's epic poem, The Rime of the Ancient Mariner. As far as I can tell, the War Memorial in Dedham is the only one that has these words inscribed.

Finally, the unveiling and dedication of the War Memorial was announced for 3 p.m. on Sunday 7 August 1921. Major-General C.M. Ross-Johnson, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O. was the guest of honour who unveiled the memorial, with the Reverend Frederick Given-Wilson conducting the occasion, which took place 'in perfect weather' (see photo on p.9). In his address to the 'large concourse of people' the general, a veteran of the Somme, said.

"Let us see that our children are brought in today's terms). up in the right way to love and honour justice and truth.

It is the character of a people which makes a nation."

In the same week, in August 1921, Madame Anna Guérin introduced poppies, made by a French-American charity's widows, to the newly-formed British Legion. Poppies had been first suggested as a symbol of Remembrance in the USA.



On the day itself, the first poppy was bought in London a few seconds after midnight. From that moment it was a seller's market. The poppies were on sale at an official price of three pence (3d) but before breakfast single petals were selling in Smithfield Market for £5. Queen Mary was apparently told that the poppies were in short supply, so bought only two. A basket of poppies auctioned at Christies's raised nearly £500. That first appeal eventually raised more than £106,000 (i.e. nearly £30 million

This year the British Legion's target is a more modest £900.000 - to mark

> the 90th anniversary of the Poppy Appeal. Let us in Dedham, as we mark the same anniversary of our War Memorial, do our part to help them reach their target - as we 'wear a poppy with pride'.

 A competition for a sponge to a given recipe was won by Mrs. Pearce, with Mrs. Marjorie Smith second and Mrs Eley third'.


A Century Ago November 1911
