DEDHAM PARISH COUNCIL: CO-OPTION OF A COUNCILLOR

Following the formal publication of a vacancy on the Parish Council no request was made for a bye-election, meaning that the Council is now able to proceed with the appointment of a new councillor by way of a direct co-option. The Council agreed at its meeting on 8th October that the criteria to be applied in recruiting to this vacancy would be to open it to all residents of the village (as defined in the criteria for parish elections). Accordingly, applications for appointment to the vacant councillor position on Dedham Parish Council. Applicants will be expected to contribute generally to the work of the Council across a range of activities which include, *inter alia*, financial management, planning, transport, maintenance, recreation, and crime prevention. The new councillor would need practically to add value to the teamwork of the Council across these areas. Interested applicants should please include in a letter of application details of:

- The range of your existing knowledge and contacts with the village.





SONGS OF PRAISE

Lord, for the years your love has kept and guided, urged and inspired us, cheered us on our way, sought us and saved us, pardoned and provided: Lord of the years, we bring our thanks today.



(Hymns Old & New 310)

Tim Dudley-Smith

Tim Dudley Smith, retired Bishop of Thetford, has given us many great hymns, of which this, along with his contemporary setting of the 'Magnificat', *Tell out, my soul*, are among the most well known. This classic, robust and eminently singable hymn was written in 1967 for the centenary of Scripture Union. It was later chosen by Dr. George Carey for the service when he became Archbishop of Canterbury in 1991. It has also proved popular at services to mark key anniversaries of the Second World War, and more recently was chosen to celebrate the Millennium.

The hymn abounds in scriptural references. For example, the second verse draws on Philippians (2:16), Luke (24:32) and 2 Timothy (3:16):

Lord, for that word, the word of life which fires us, speaks to our hearts and sets our souls ablaze, teaches and trains, rebukes us an inspires us:

Lord of the word, receive your people's praise.

There is a wonderful sweep, both from the nation to the world and then to ourselves. At the end of 2001, Dudley-Smith was asked by 'Churches Together in England' to write another verse for this hymn to be sung at services celebrating the Golden Jubilee of HM The Queen. He did so, but said that it should not become a permanent part of the hymn:

Lord, for our hopes, the dreams of all our living, Christ and his kingdom, one united aim; Rulers and peoples bound in high thanksgiving, Lord of our hopes, our trust is in your Name.

The strength and power of this hymn are enhanced by the tune LORD OF THE YEARS which was written specially for these words by Michael Baughen, a former vicar of All Souls, Langham Place, London, and later Bishop of Chester. A few years ago, bishop Michael stayed at Dedham Hall while on a painting course there.


DOUBLE WINNER

OUTSTANDING!

Though it came as no surprise to anyone involved in Dedham C.E. Primary School in recent years, it came as a welcome acknowledgement of all the hard work of the Headteacher, Heather Tetchner, and her dedicated staff team, that the School was judged by the recent OFSTED Inpection to be 'Outstanding'. A summary of their key findings is given here:

- ◆ Outstanding leadership and management and excellent relationships underpin the school's success. Leadership from the headteacher is resolute and determined. Teaching and pupils' achievement have improved considerably since the last inspection. The uncompromising vision of a school at the heart of its community and the mission to 'nurture a lifelong love of learning' are met very effectively.
- ♦ Teaching is outstanding. Lessons are highly motivating because teachers link subjects together very effectively to make learning relevant. Within the innovative curriculum, the provision for pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development is outstanding.
- ♦ All parents and carers who responded in Parent View agree that their children are happy, safe and taught well in school. All would recommend the school to others.
- ♦ Pupils make rapid and sustained progress from generally average starting points. By the time they leave at the end of Year 6, attainment is at a much higher level than found nationally. For example, in mathematics, pupils are a year and a term ahead of pupils nationally.

- ♦ Almost all disabled pupils and those with special educational needs make similar progress to their peers. A very small number make good rather than outstanding progress.
- ♦ Pupils' behaviour is outstanding. Enthusiasm and perseverance are key features of pupils' exceptionally positive attitudes to learning. Their excellent social skills, good manners and respect for others prepare them very well for their futures.

SMARTYS PRE-SCHOOL



Fifty Years Ago November 1962

- ♦ CHURCH LADS' BRIGADE A new troupe was begun for boys between 10-14 years of age. Mr. Roy Blaker was the Commanding Officer, assisted by Major Dick Green, Mr. W. King and Mr R. Chesterfield, with Adrian Sharp and Alan Sage as NCOs.
- NEW KNEELERS The hassocks at the communion rail were made by Miss Dick-Cinyhnham and her helpers. Mrs P. Rowley had already supplied a cushion for the Sedilia, with Mrs P. Beevor providing a cushion for the vicar's stall. Mrs. W. Thorn was making a cushion for the Bishop's chair.

A Century Ago November 1912

PARISH CHURCHYARD The Vicar took the opportunity to explain the law relating to the churchyard; this included 'parishioners have no power to cut down trees or mow grass' here; that 'every person may at this day be buried in the churchyard of the parish where he dies'; that other non-parishioners have 'no right of burial in our churchyard'; and that 'the incumbent cannot legally appropriate or set apart a portion of the churchyard for the future use of a particular person or family.'
