



SWINE 'FLU: ARCHBISHOPS' STATEMENT

Following our statement in September 2009, we have reviewed the situation in light of the latest advice from the Department of Health. Their latest update shows that the number of new cases has risen. There were 78,000 new cases in England the first week of November, with 751 people hospitalised.

The additional information now available confirms earlier guidance that children under 16 are significantly more susceptible to the virus, and up to 30% may fall ill during this second wave. Deaths worldwide have increased by 12% in one week. The Health Protection Agency (HPA) believes that about 520,000 people have been infected by swine 'flu in England since the outbreak of the pandemic. The vaccination programme in this country has started this week. The plan is to offer it to all at risk groups by December.

Our recommendation, first made in July 2009 to those presiding at Holy Communion in parishes [that the cup should not be shared at Communion] remains unchanged. We would encourage you to continue to show patience and to pray for all those affected.

VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

CHRISTMAS IN 3-D

Revival in the making of films in '3-D' has begun to catch on. From *Niagara Falls*, nearly a century ago, to Pixar's first 3-D film, *Up*, this year, there has been several systems of production and great claims made for them. With a few exceptions the films themselves have usually been unremarkable. It has been as if the concentration on the process has meant that the producers have overlooked the basic requirement of any film, that it tells a story well.

It has got me thinking: what would it take to enjoy the same effect for Christmas? For many this festival is rather like an old 3-D film; full of high hopes and hard work, but more often than not followed by disappointment. Here are some suggestions for a 'full-feature 3-D Christmas' that will not disappoint.

on't be satisfied with 'Xmas' I sense that there's been a change in the past year. Christmas had become overshadowed by commercial pressures, to the extent that some people would dread this time of year, being unable to afford to keep up with expectations. Now that many more are feeling that pressure, we are once again wondering what it takes to make a good Christmas, without resulting in a New Year headache. The answer is to put Christ back into *Christ*-mas. That way we can recall what as children we

once knew - that a simple, thoughtful token of love means much more than expensive but empty gestures.

evote some time to God
If there is one thing sure to spoil
your Christmas it is having no time for
yourself, as you dash round looking
after everybody else. Worship of God
combines time with Him and time for
oneself. Choose one or more of the
opportunities provided in Dedham this

Christmas to worship God, and you may be surprised how that benefits *you*. After all, God does not ask us to worship Him for His sake - but ours.

ecide to share the festival Whether it is by giving a gift to a charity of your choice, or offering some time to help others in greater need than you, the blessings which come from developing a generous heart are available to us all. True worship begins not in religious places, but in a thankful heart. Being grateful for our blessings, and for wisdom gained through the heartache of our losses and disappointments, can be brought to the Crib and offered to our Saviour. We will then be reminded that the blessings of giving are not limited by our resources - but by our gratitude.

NEWSROUND

CHANCEL CLEARED

On the second Saturday in November a team of volunteers cleared the chancel of the church of everything moveable, in preparation for the major refurbishment project which has begun. Some items, such as the main Communion table, were very heavy. Others, like the candle holder. or corona lucis, required careful handling. Finding a place to store everything was another challenge. The whole project was accomplished in just over an hour. The Vicar and Churchwardens are very grateful to the team, who worked together so well.

SILVER PYX DEDICATED

On the day after the chancel was cleared, a silver pyx (see next paragraph for a definition) was dedicated for use in our Parish Church. Commissioned by Rosemary Hartley, in loving memory of her late husband Christopher John Hartley, it was handmade by local craftsman Roy Flewin, in what he has called an 'Arts and Crafts' able to celebrate our worship of God with a combination of such local generosity and skill.

A pyx or pix (Latin: pyxis, from the Greek: πυξίς for a box-wood receptacle, from 'pyxos', the box-tree) traditionally refers to a small, round container used to carry the Communion bread or wafers to those otherwise unable to come to a church to receive Holy Communion. The plural of pyx is **pyxides**. The term is also used describe other small, round, lidded boxes designed for any purpose from antiquity or the Middle Ages. Our pyx will be used to store communion wafers before they are consecrated.

STAIRWAY TO HEAVEN?

The problem of gaining safe access to certain heights in church, for example, to arrange flowers over the North door, or change the hangings to mark the liturgical season, has been solved by the generosity of the Friends of Dedham Church who have made a grant for the purchase of some 'warehouse steps' for the church. Given no choice over the original colour (a garish blue) the steps were subsequently re-painted by Roy Flewin with a more modest style. We are particularly blessed to be colour ('cappuccino'), in paints supplied by Plasti-Kot. The Parish Church is very grateful to lacquie Freeman and the Friends for their help and support.





The most interesting member of the group was the shop, with windows glazed with bottle-glass panes, where the Hunnaballs did a thriving fish trade, supplemented by sweets and small sundries. The name Hunnaball appear in the Marriage Registers of the 18th century with the following variants - n 1727, Honeybell; in 1751, Hannibal; and later as Honeyball, Honiball, Hannibal and Hunniball. The Burial Register of 1750 contains the careful entry. "Honeyballl or Hunnibal." The family group, who posed for the photographer, includes Emma Hunnaball to whom, as Mrs. Cottee, I am indebted for the photo here faithfully and artistically reproduced. DEDHAM c. 1790

The shop was doubtless the lineal descendant of the Cheese House, where the products of the Hall Farm were purveyed to the townsfolk. The Overhall and Netherhall Manors include the moiety of the primary manor transferred to the Nuns of Campsey Priory by Sir John de Stuteville in 1240. In a Campsey Steward's account for Michaelmas 1414-5, "the Cheese House" is entered as rented for "3s. 4d. to Katherine Leyham for a house at the gate of the manor, called the Cheese house. "This must be distinguished from the namesake Cheese House (next to the Marlboro' Head 17 Netherhall (later Dedham Hall in High Street), appendant to the primary Manor and farmyard, which occupied the site of the Square. doubt for centuries the two were active competitors for local custom.

The demolition of the cottages made room for the diversion of the old approach, and its reconstruction as an Entrance Drive to the modern residence of Dedham Hall, and invites a further footnote on neighbouring topography. On the further side of the banked meadow-land, which flanks the Dedham Hall Drive, there is a little row of four low-lying cottages: these, with their associated premises, appear on early Manor Rolls, with copious varieties of spelling, as Conifer Stead. No survivors of the fir-tree plantation remain, but the fish-pond, which covered the rectangular meadow bordering on the High Street, retained the name of **Nether Pond**, as testified by the following entry in the 1762 Rental "I Feb 1748 - Thomas Watkinson...ffor a parcel of Meadow adjoining (Conyfirs Slade) and containing one Acre and one Rood called the Nether pond ... Is 4d." The meadow fills the gap between the Conifers and Dedham Hall Drive, and the entry preserves the memory of the two ancient fishponds, reserved to the Lordship by the terms of the original 1243 partition of the Manor. ❖





- ♦ MAGAZINE ARTWORK 1959 was the first year in which the cover of the Parish Magazine was that of a local view, and in colour. No artist was credited. It was used until December 1960.
- ♦ VICAR'S INDISPOSITION The Vicar was unwell a few days before Christmas; he was grateful to the new chaplain at Severalls Hospital for assisting with the Midnight Service.
- ♦ B.B.C. OUTSIDE BROADCAST 'Sunday Half-hour' on the Light Programme came from Dedham in January 1960.
- SUPPER AT THE 'ESSEX ROSE' Someone had kindly arranged a light supper at the 'Essex Rose' for the Choir and Choral Society after the broadcast.

A Century Ago December 1909 & January 1910

- $\ \, \diamondsuit$ LANTERN LECTURE on behalf of the British and Foreign Bible Society in the Memorial Hall on 'Korea'.
- ♦ CRICKET CLUB a Whist Drive and Dance raised £6 6s.
- ♦ MINISTRY MATTERS During 1909 there were 22 Baptisms, 9 Marriages, and 36 Burials at Dedham, of which 5 were infants under the age of 2 years, and a child of 8 years old. There were 7 deaths between the ages of 20 and 60; and the remaining 23, ranging from 66 to 96 years old, giving an average of 77¾. 'The prolonged cold of the spring, the wet summer, and still wetter autumn, must have tried severely weak constitutions and the declining vitality of the aged.'

This picture of some 'Old Brook Street Cottages', and the text below, comes from a Christmas card commissioned from the artist John Foster by Canon Gerald Rendall in the 1930s.

NCE more through the skill and kindness of Mr. J.E Foster, my New Year's Greeting to Dedham friends may serve as a memento of scenes fast vanishing from living memories. The group of cottages depicted stood at the Brook Street end or High Street. In the picture, their exact location is shown by the gable-end of Mr. Foster's own house, with its mansard roof: and, on the spot, by the white posts of its railed enclosure, which preserves the frontal lines of the site on which they stood. This belonged to the Demesne of the Overhall and Netherhall Manor, and the cottages, four or five in all, were appendant to the Manor House and Farm of Dedham Hall, the residential nucleus of the Manor. In the 1762 Rental of the Manor, they were heal at rents varying from Is. 8d. to Id.

In 1903, when death-sentence was pronounced by Mr. Eben[ezer] Clover, the cottage to the left of the picture, with rounded bow-window facing down the King's Highway, was rented by the Sharps: next to it came that of the Hunnaballs, with shop adjoining, and a useful adjunct in the Archery Piece Close stretching eastward beyond Mr. Fosters house. Two more cottages, tenanted by the Grimwoods and the Coles respectively, rounded the corner and faced on to the roadway leading to the Farm. This was then a cart-track driven in a straight line from the farmyard to the gateway a Archery Piece, whore it turned at a sharp right angle past Mr. Foster's house (popularly known as Muniment House, because School *muniments* were lodged there!) to join the High Street.
