



Great Expectations ...

I think for many gardeners May and lune are perhaps the most exciting months in the garden: lush green growth and emerging flowers make it a time of great anticipation. Currently the star performer has to be pruned!! Magnolia 'Susan' with its superb flowers in shades of pink which emerged at the end of March and will probably continue into lune. Check this one out if you are after a small tree with flower power! Also good for the small garden is Cercis siliquastrum: clusters of pink flowers are now on show, but strangely, these appear on the trunk and branches before any leaves - something of an oddity However, while everything is growing apace, so are the weeds!

[Abologies for mentioning the W word!] annual invaders must be removed before they flower and set seed or you will regret it later as more pop up to compete with plants for moisture and food. Hoe them out if you can on a sunny day and just leave them to dry up. But you really have to get down to it with those nasty deep-rooted pernicious weeds like the dreaded ground elder; if you leave just a small piece of root behind it will take off again. These weeds must not go into your compost bin. If you do resort to a chemical weed killer it helps if you cut the stems and crush the leaves for better absorption, and hopefully, a better result! Then a good mulching will restrict further weed growth and improve the soil structure; don't forget that grass clippings can be used as a mulch as there are often too many for the compost bin at this time of the year. Don't waste this natural resource! Result: instant improvement all round.

Now we have the roses to enjoy: alas, we also have to deal with dead-heading them, but just a minute! Some years ago, I read about an experiment on different ways of dead-heading (probably done by *Gardening*

Which?): conventional methods were trialled as well as using a hedge trimmer to slice off the dead blooms! Surprisingly the decapitated bushes continued to produce more roses almost as well as those carefully pruned!! Now I'm not advocating this modus operandi, but perhaps we don't need to be quite so finicky with the secateurs after all

Oriental poppies like 'Pattie's Plum' make a stunning show in June, but oh dear, how untidy they are after flowering, so cut the whole plant right back to make space for summer bedding and new leaves will appear later in the year. I hope many of you will be growing the sweet peas that we gave out at our Spring Show (kindly donated by one of our members): do check them out if it's windy as they might need help to climb up their supports before their tendrils get a hold. Keep picking the flowers and they will go on for ages.

Down in the veg plot you can keep planting out French and runner beans until August; likewise, you will get a succession of salad leaves or any of the annual herbs like dill and coriander if you sow seeds at two-weekly intervals and keep them well watered. Remember last summer!!

I know there are always jobs to do – some more rewarding than others - but after all that gardening therapy ensure that you MAKE time to enjoy your garden (not easy for some of us as there's always a distraction!). Even if it's only an hour or so, forget Brexit, grab a chair, something to drink, and reflect on what the poet Dorothy Gurney wrote in 1913: "The kiss of the sun for pardon, The song of the birds for mirth, One is nearer God's heart in a garden than anywhere else on earth". Yes, the weeding can wait till tomorrow.

Memories of a child's evacuation in World War II PART II By Sylvia Nodder

We were very well cared for by the elderly Mr & Mrs Martindale and their maid Milly, who washed our hair in lemon juice and polished our shoes each day. (Years later I received little religious tracts from Mrs Martindale when they had retired to the Lake District, and once my husband and I went to see them shortly after we were married). But when Harry Pilkington moved up to his Thurso estate in Scotland of course he took secretary with him which meant for me a new billet with my new fragile looking red haired friend, Connie Hilling. This time the house was up at Wash Common on the Andover Road in Newbury, and it was again a 2-up 2down with no bathroom, belonging to another young couple Mr & Mrs Spicer. Army convoys drove by on their way to Salisbury Plain, and if there were only a few of them we gave them tea - I suppose not yet rationed.



Mrs Spicer was at home, and her husband made aeroplane parts and was not therefore called up. They were both extremely kind. But when we helped to wash up I detested Mrs Spicer's smelly dishcloth, & so used my hand instead, which was not approved of, and Mrs Spicer said that she was sure my mother would not like me to do that, and I had to stop, unless there was nobody in the kitchen.

When nothing had happened in London in the summer of 1940 the school opened 2 classes for the youngest pupils in the building in Hammersmith, and I went home to Chiswick, to go each day lessons there. However, in September serious air raids on London began and at school we often had to take shelter in one of the cloakrooms. At night when the blitz had begun in earnest we slept in our Anderson shelter in the garden, from where we could hear the shattering noise and feel the vibration of the anti-aircraft guns in Chiswick Park. It was possible in the garden to read a newspaper by the light of the terrible fires, raging through the East End docks, which were miles away on the other side of London. 250,000 people lost their houses in the East End in the first 6 weeks of the blitz. Yet again a letter was sent to our parents and I dutifully arrived back in Newbury.

I was taken by Miss Titmuss, one of our teachers, to my 4th and last billet. This was a substantial corner house of about 1900, built with William Morris influence, and had stained glass windows in the turret and front door. The owner, Mrs Swaite had a pork butcher's shop in the town centre, which she had inherited from her father, so we had

unusually good war time food! In the conservatory there was an empty aviary, the 9 budgerigars having slowly died for lack of their imported seeds. Mrs Swaite drove me every Sunday morning before lunch to Greenham Common (long before the Americans occupied it) where we walked her small white terrier which barked incessantly all the way there. The monthly ration of petrol, I think only 2 gallons, restricted going any further. While I was in this billet I was confirmed from school in a local church in Newbury. and sometimes later went to the eight o'clock service by myself.

On weekday mornings I regularly walked down into the high street to join queues at the shops for difficult to come by special items, strawberries, tomatoes, new potatoes and fish, to save Mrs Swaite's housekeeper from having to do that. In the afternoons we had lessons at the Girls High School. The Newbury girls obviously needed to keep their laboratories for their own experiments, so our science lessons were pretty dull & very sketchy, in our form rooms. In English we read The Odyssey & The Iliad and recited English tenses. We had a wonderful Lancashire geography teacher, and we loved singing English folk songs with Miss Gretton, whose grand-daughter is now a well-known soprano. We had regular medicals with a dotty old lady doctor. The only space available for this was in headmistress's office and the ı remember my embarrassment standing only in my knickers while she was at her desk. She averted her eyes.

As hostilities in London had apparently ceased the school went back to Hammersmith in the Spring of 1944, but this lull was not to last as the Germans launched their doodlebug attacks at the very time we were taking school certificate exams. All pupils were sent home or evacuated again except the examinees, who were kept on. We were collected in downstairs class rooms where the windows had been stuck with netting for protection against flying glass, so we couldn't see out. During an exam, if the engine of a doodlebug above us cut out, meaning that it was about to descend, our invigilator told us to get under our desks and she got under hers, until the bomb exploded, and we all stood up This as you can again. imagine disrupted our concentration, but we were cheered up to be told that for every bomb which exploded in the vicinity we would be given 4 marks. There were 4 of these during our French exam and we each had a 16 mark bonus so that our French results were surprisingly good!

And so to my last evacuation, when in order to avoid the danger of any more flying bombs I was despatched to stay with my aunt & uncle & cousin Chris, in Newcastle, where their bombing had ceased. It was almost impossible to get a seat on a long distance train because of the frequent movement of troops, but my brother-in-law who was seeing me off, jumped on my train as it was coming in to Kings Cross, and secured me a place at a table. Unfortunately the small boy who came to sit opposite me

with his mother was sick all over the table and 10 days later I got chicken pox. However, I was very spoilt and enjoyed being with my relations for a 10-week stay before returning home.

The final German onslaught was from rockets. Our family was quietly having tea in Chiswick when there was a sudden enormous explosion. My brother cycled over to Stavely Road where there was smoke rising up, and found that 6 houses had heen destroyed and one unfortunate soldier on leave who was walking by had been killed. This destruction had been caused by the Ist German rocket attack. Others followed, but I was evacuated again.

Despite some great evacuee unhappiness, the people on whom I was billeted were extremely kind don't remember generous. ı occasion when they were not. I know that in the first year they were paid 8 shillings a week for each child, to be collected at the Post Office. A similar huge evacuation would not be possible now because most householders would not be at home to look after the children.

There would have to be camps, and to think of the vetting of staff and the counselling of staff and children, which would now be considered necessary, makes the mind boggle. We had no such thing. I was not unhappy during my war years. My father sent me the Girls' Crystal every week, and my mother wrote every week and sometimes sent a few sweets when

available. I had good billets and we were all very grateful for the concern and kindness of our teachers, who in effect were in loco parentis for each of us.



The war ended at last, an unforgettable and wonderful rejoicing taking place in central London on VE night. possible light had been switched on after war years of darkness. Along the walk from Waterloo by the bank of the river small boats had been moored, each lit up by a rainbow coloured Beautiful. My sister and I fountain. squeezed through the crowds to the front of Buckingham Palace, where thousands of people were singing, laughing, kissing each other, shouting loudly for the King & Queen and Winston Churchill to come out on the balcony again and again, which they Even Princess Elizabeth and did. Princess Margaret were out in the crowd with their escorts.

We got back to Waterloo in time for the last train, but of course the platform was lined with people with the same idea. The train had no corridor so in our carriage, designed to hold 4 people a-side, 8 people sat, 8 people sat on their knees, and about 8 people stood squashed in the middle. We stood, but we did get home, overcome with the sense of national joy we had taken part in that night.

VJ day later was nothing like as memorable – it was a huge organised national celebration designed to include representatives of all peoples who had helped us in the war.

P.S. After the war all our foreign allies which when in this country had surged on London, especially Piccadilly and its surroundings, went back to their own countries, America, Canada, France, Poland, South Africa, Australia and others. Large numbers of our own forces were gradually demobbed each with a supply of civilian clothes and a little money. I think £250. Housing for them was at a premium, and they and their families had to get used to living

with each other again, which was not always easy. Britain was broke, rationing became worse than before, and school life resumed a more traditional routine. To have reached peace after contending with enormous

German power was an amazing achievement by the allies, but I found the new situation rather dull What a limited outlook that was! Heigh Ho.



The End

An Evening with Terry Waite of my life. In his speech, he likened 28th April 2019 "anger" to "fire" that needs to be put off

We all have a mission in life. The question is how and when we will solve the puzzle and discover that mission. I had the privilege to listen to Mr.Terry Waite at St Mary's Church Dedham and witnessed someone who solved his mystery. In his case, the mission grew itself through despicable suffering and injustice. He spent 5 years of his life in solitary confinement in a dark room, blindfolded, chained from his led and arms for 23 hours on each day. Even though he was warned against going to Lebanon due to the risks involved, he went, because he had promised to do so, not to miss the chance of visiting and helping other hostages.

As soon as he was released he established Hostage UK and later Hostage International to help hostages and their families. His resolute commitment to helping others urged me to question my mission and justification

"anger" to "fire" that needs to be put off immediately, which he managed to do so in his first week of captivity. He broke the cycle of hatred and animosity against those people who were keeping him under inhumane conditions. "Forgiving others starts with forgiving yourself first; if you forgive, you open your way, you move forward." he stated. Having said that, he underlined it does not mean he agreed what was done to him, but he tried to empathise with them to understand how they could become so cruel to a human being.

d, he Do we know how many people in our local o do parish live in solitude? Most of us are and preoccupied and overwhelmed with our individual lives which in turn fortifies the barriers among members of the society later gradually in the long run?

Have we ever thought about other people living in other countries being oppressed by autocratic regimes and thousands of innocent people being kept in solitary confinements in agony, away from the loved ones? Martin Luther King, Ir said: "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere" Before I went to Mr. Waite's speech I had listened to his speeches online and ordered one of his books, Taken on Trust, to get it signed. One of his most striking messages was 'You can keep my body imprisoned, you can try to control my mind by torturing but you can not control my soul. It will always be free.` This message was so similar to what I had recently read in a book authored by Ahmet Altan, who has been in a Turkish jail for the last 3 years along with other thousands of people post-2016 alleged `coup attempt` in Turkey, without any substantial evidence of doing. Mr.Altan similarly talks about the reality of a body made of flesh, bone, blood, muscle, and nerve that was trapped on one hand, and an untouchable mind on the other. While listening to Mr.Waite, I felt obliged to seize the opportunity to establish a communication channel between him and Mr.Altan, who are living in parallel universes without knowing each other albeit giving similar messages with the limitless power derived from their innocence.

Mr.Waite had to write his memories in captivity in his mind to turn them into a book upon his release, while Mr Altan was lucky enough to sneak out some notes out of jail to be published in the UK as a book. When I gave Mr.Altan's recent book, 'I Will Never See The World Again', to Mr.Waite and briefly explained what the book was all about, his first response was 'I have to write a letter to him'. There is always something we can do for others in the most dire conditions.

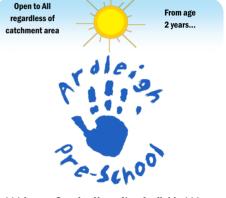

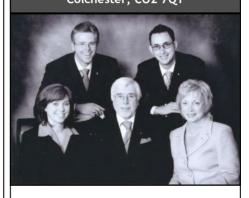

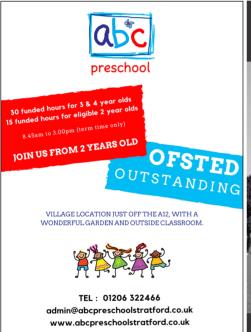
