THOUGHT FOR FEBRUARY

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another".

A basic Christian tenet, never was more relevant than it is today.

Before Lent begins in earnest later this month, we celebrate that famous saint for all true romantics today; St. Valentine. Although from the way we celebrate this saint's day you might be forgiven for thinking that he was a talented matchmaker, he was actually a minister and physician in Rome in the late third century.

He ministered to Christians suffering during the persecution of Christians by the emperor Claudius Gothicus and was eventually martyred around 270 A. D. – not very romantic, I confess!

lesus had much to say about love during his life and ministry on earth. In fact, He gave a new command to His first followers on the subject: "love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." (John 13:34) But what did Jesus mean by love?

How are we to love one another? If the books and poems are to be believed, love is an uncontrollable feeling, it is about how the other person makes us feel:

I love you because you are beautiful kind, funny, clever and so on. There are many kinds of love: romantic love, the love of a parent, the love of a sibling or close friend.

But how does lesus want His followers to love each other? "As I have loved you." Jesus doesn't love us because of anything inherently lovely in us - in fact. He loves us in spite of ourselves. The wonder at the heart of the Christian message, the Gospel is that "God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

He willingly gave up His life to save ours. So when He says, "As I have loved you, so you must love one another" we begin to get a sense of just how big a thing that is!

STEP BY STEP INTO 2023

Over recent years, my attitude to each New Year has changed. I'm not referring to the seasonal fireworks, resolutions, Hogmanay, Jools Holland, counting down to the pop of champagne corks...

It wasn't always like this. Christmas is the 'main thing' in our family and New Year seemed somehow forced, an effort to celebrate. Dare I say... it seemed a little Contrived.

So, what has changed?

Just a few years ago, I came across the notion of talking to God about the year ahead. The idea resonated. I began asking, 'God, what are Your plans for me in the upcoming year?' 'Are my plans in sync with Yours?' It is easy and so obvious to ask God what His plans are.

After all, He knows what lies ahead. I then began to dedicate my plans, hopes, and wishes to His Lordship. There are the big things... when and where to take holidays, what to focus on at work, which school / job to apply for... Others seem more trivial. But they are not... I love the fact that God really is interested in what I grow in the veg plot and which birthday card to choose!

This is the practice of consecration... the word may sound archaic, but the reality is very different. Consecration allows God in. We are inviting Him to infuse the year ahead with His grace, love, counsel, protection, and peace.

Here's a current example...

In 2022, as we all emerged from COVID restrictions, a small group in Ardleigh began to pray about how to reach out to young families in the parish. I was not part of that group, but I'm so grateful to them. Their prayers are resulting in something new and exciting. As relative newbies to Dedham/Ardleigh churches (we only started to worship

here, in our local parish, in 2021), I was struck by the absence of children or young families in our church services. I am a childcare professional (previously a nursery provider, tutor and now podcaster), so when asked to consider how we might make church more welcoming to children, my response was a definite 'YES'!

Perfect timing. Was this an accident? I don't think so. It has taken longer than hoped to get things off the ground, due to the necessary processes and regulations required to keep everyone safe. We lost a little momentum, meaning that the launch of Little Steps in Ardleigh and Junior Church in Dedham were delayed until the autumn.

It has been a slow start, but families are coming and enjoy the sessions. There is a kindness to this slow start. We are not disheartened; we're learning so much. Now we are eager to stepping out further, to get to know more young families in our villages.

I have found this New Year the perfect time to check out whether our plans are in sync with God's... asking just that... Is He in this? We believe He is. Here are some of the reasons why... Young families need to feel welcome in our church services.

This means having resources and activities that children can access easily whenever they come to church. It is also wonderful to see some Sunday services becoming more family friendly in both parishes.

We want to welcome children of all ages. Thank you to those who have worked over the years to build links between our churches and schools.

And so, we move into 2023 with renewed vision, moving step by step with God and young families in our communities.

She has been a volunteer for Guide Dogs for 60 years, starting out as a fundraiser before becoming a public speaker for 45 years.

Over the past 35 years Marjorie, who is chairman of the Charity's Stour Valley branch has also raised 31 puppies on their Journeys to becoming guide dogs.

Last year she was also given the Pearl Volunteer Award for Longstanding Dedication from the charity.

She was also on the parochial parish council of the church and was once a Girl Guide leader

St Richard, who was Bishop of Chichester for eight years in the mid-13th century, was well acquainted with both hard work and suffering. Though a gifted scholar and lawyer, he did not flinch from physical labour; and as Bishop he found himself a homeless outcast in his own diocese, until King Henry III finally accepted his appointment by the Pope. His prayer reflects the commitment and 'stickability' needed by anyone who seeks to be a true follower of Jesus.

February 23rd

The Deanery Choir will be singing at the Confirmation service at Harwich at 7pm and the anthem they have chosen to sing is **Lead me, Lord** a setting by **Fred Bock**.

In Christian churches that practise infant baptism, confirmation is seen as the sealing of the covenant created in baptism. Those being confirmed are known as confirmands. For adults, it is an affirmation of belief. It involves laying on of hands by the Bishop and is a very important service in the church calendar.

MARJORIE WEST

Sadly we must report the death of Marjorie West on December 23rd. During her nearly 102 year life she saw five monarchs, meeting just the last in 2021 when she had turned 100 and he was still Prince of Wales.



She was born in Brentford in 1921, and followed the local football team throughout her life although first watching them live when she was eighty years old, as crowds were exclusively male in her youth. This is just one example of tremendous social change in her lifetime.

She married her teenage love in 1942 when they were both 21;Ted Graysmark, newly qualified as a Spitfire pilot in the RAF Reserve. He was recalled to his squadron after just seven days of their honeymoon, and tragically was killed in the defence of Malta five weeks later.

Marjorie was inspired to join the war effort, and volunteered for the WRNS with her skills as a teleprinter operator. After basic training and a spell in Poole she was assigned to SHAEF, General Eisenhower's team planning for D-Day. SHAEF moved to Versailles in September 1944, and she met another airman, Victor West in Paris.

After return to civilian life the relationship blossomed and they married, having two children, who in turn

delivered Marjorie five grandchildren and fourteen great-grandchildren. She was delighted by youngsters, and watched them arrive and develop with great pleasure.

Over the years, Marjorie worked in various roles, including with the Midland Bank and British Airways. This last job brought the benefit of discounted flights, which she and husband Victor used to travel extensively. Particular pleasure came from visits to family in Oregon and New Zealand.

In 1988, Vic and Marjorie moved with their son, Colin and his wife, Lyn and their family to Grove Hill House in Dedham. They both immediately threw themselves into village activities. Marjorie was a keen member of Dedham WI and Ladies Fellowship. With her love of children, a highlight of her week was visiting Dedham Primary to listen to the children read. She was a church flower arranger and enjoyed attending Family Service in Dedham Church. She rarely missed a Remembrance Sunday service, in later years arriving in her wheelchair when mobility became a problem.

Victor died in 1999; Marjorie remained active in Dedham village activities for some years. In October 2019, she was presented with the Légion d'Honneur at a short ceremony in the Duchy Barn, conferred by President Hollande of France. She found brief national fame on BBC News in May 2020 (75 years on from VE Day,) being interviewed about her wartime life, and her walking during the Covid pandemic to raise funds for the NHS, following in the footsteps of Captain Tom Moore.

In 2021 she moved to Wethersfield with Colin and Lyn. Mobility was a problem, but visitors were always welcome into Marjorie's quarters. She is survived by Colin and by her daughter Christine, and is much missed by the extended family.

EAST ANGLIA GREEN (EAG) PYLON PROPOSALS.

This is to update everyone who has contacted me on the issue of the East Anglia GREEN (EAG) pylon proposals. Please forgive the general nature of this email. I have had vast numbers of emails objecting to these proposals (which is itself a very strong indicator!) so I thought it best email everyone with a general update in the interests of time.

As many will know, I chair the OFFSET (Offshore Electricity Transmission System) group of MPs from Essex, Suffolk and Norfolk. We have been campaigning for an off-shore ring main to replace the current proposals for on-shore pylons as put forward by the Electricity Supply Operator (ESO) which is part of National Grid. Recently, the OFFSET MPS met the energy minister, Graham Stuart MP. Previously, we had secured a commitment from National Grid Transmission Network to produce a costed version of an offshore alternative to East Anglia GREEN.

Their costed option is merely a point-to-point undersea link and fails to optimise all the advantages of a fully coordinated offshore network, which connects to the offshore wind farms, coastal power stations like Sizewell, and with interconnectors to the European

continent. The OFFSET MPs were very clear about how unacceptable this is. National Grid Electricity System Operator initially agreed to produce a costed alternative to East Anglia GREEN that that would do this. It appears, however, that the Department for Business Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) discouraged them from this.

The OFFSET MPs will continue to push the department to explore an optimised offshore alternative to East Anglia GREEN and we have today written to the Minister again making this point. Beyond the fundamental flaws with the EAG proposals, such as the lack of strategic forward planning, there are various location-specific issues within the current plans which are nonsensical. The Ardleigh substation is completely unnecessary.

There is a viable alternative, which would neither require the massive expansion of infrastructure at Ardleigh, nor the planned double run of cables, back and forth around the north of Colchester. The alternative would connect the new off-shore wind farms, North Falls and Five Estuaries, direct to the Nautilus multi-modal connector at Felixstowe. Despite my highlighting this repeatedly, there has been no willingness to adopt a common sense approach and change the plans.

This is a very bad indicator of how the whole of EAG is being treated as a done deal. It is an uphill battle across the board and typifies the difficulties OFFSET and local campaigners have had over the past year. Finally, thank you for all the kind words regarding mine and my parliamentary colleagues' efforts to see these proposals changed.

I am struck by the strength of feeling and sheer numbers of emails from hundreds of constituents all making the same arguments against the current plans.

SUSTAINABLE DEDHAM.

The local campaign group is making a strong case and I will keep pressing these arguments at every level of Government.

I am afraid we must keep fighting these proposals. I am incredibly grateful to the local campaign being coordinated by volunteers, and their work may yet prove decisive.

Be it how we drive in and through the village and in what form of vehicles, how we ensure that the river and surrounding meadows are used in a way that does not harm the environment, and that housing and other relevant policies follow clear sustainable principles. This means any vision has to be more than asking councils or other public bodies to do things, it has to be what we as a village community can and should be doing.

As a resident of Dedham for more than 20 years, I am now in a position to give more time to working with others to improve the quality of life for everyone. I am keen to hear from others in the village, particularly community groups, on how we can work together to develop and promote a vision and what perhaps could be called a Charter for Sustainable Dedham.

I have already had conversations with the Parish Council in the village, who are supportive of what I would like to see happen. I see an initial goal is to form a Forum of interested groups to develop such a vision and charter.

My background is in education with specific experience in Sustainable development. I am happy to come and talk to interested groups and start an online conversation about these matters.

SPORTS CLUB PAVILION IMPROVEMENTS

Dedham Sports Club took advantage of the recent lockdowns to spend some time and money making improvements to the pavilion.



The Lounge area

The bar and lounge area has been redecorated and new storage has been installed behind the bar.

The kitchen has been completely refurbished and equipped with commercial catering appliances including a large oven, a microwave oven, a new fridge and a high specification dishwasher. The kitchen now benefits from hygienic, easy to clean, stainless work surfaces and wall cladding.

The hot water and heating system has been upgraded and a new boiler and hot water tanks have been installed.

New emergency exit lighting and smoke alarms have also been installed.

The club has further plans for the pavilion including new lounge furniture, new flooring and improved energy efficient lighting. The building can accommodate groups of up to 60 people and we have already hosted several private parties and events since carrying out the work.

The club wants to share this facility with the wider community, making it a social hub in the village, so would welcome ideas from the community for the future development of the club.

The forerunner of the Sports Club pavilion was the Dedham Village club which was built in 1893. The 1896 revised Ordnance Survey map shows a building in a similar position (though parallel to the Path through the drift) to the existing building, later maps describe the building as a reading room. The extract of an article in the the Essex Standard describes the opening of the Dedham Village Club. The long speech by Sir John Gorst has been omitted.

The British NEWSPAPER Archive Essex Standard -Saturday 21 January 1893

NEW VILLAGE CLUB FOR DEDHAM. Opening by Sir John Gorst, M.P.

Yearning to keep abreast of the progressive spirit of the age, some of the more public-spirited inhabitants of the pretty village of Dedham thought there was one thing lacking in their beautiful oasis, viz., village club. This feeling, commendable all times gradually, but surely gaining ground, certain supporters of the movement made representation to the Vicar of the parish (Rev C. Alfred Jones), and he, acting with promptitude and showing characteristic public spirit, called an open meeting of parishioners in August last.

The unanimity of the meeting was gratifying it was unexpected, and from this time the project has developed until Monday evening, Jan. 16, saw the Village Club opened. The inhabitants owe a lasting debt of gratitude to their Vicar, who threw his whole heart and soul into the work from its inception its close. Other leading inhabitants, irrespective of party or creed—for the Dedham Village Club knows no politics—co-operated with him most willingly, and as the result of their efforts a capital site was acquired the south-east corner of Duchy Farm in the occupation of Mr Gooch, the necessary funds (as nearly as possible £200) having been raised by loan from the bankers and Guaranteed by the Vicar, Mr. Hamilton Lang, Mr. J. Medows Rodwell, and Mr Tremlett. The building itself has been erected by Messrs. Saunders and Son, and gives general satisfaction. The exterior is of galvanised iron, the inside is match-boarded, and

there are three rooms for reading and recreation.

On Monday evening, Jan. 16, the Club was declared open by Sir John Gorst, Q.C., M.P., in the presence of large company of villagers. The meeting, which was held in the largest room of the new premises, was presided over by the Rev. C. Alfred Jones (vicar), and among those present beside Sir John Gorst were Mr. J. Medows Hodwell, Dr. Ashwin, Mr. English, Mr. Cooper Fenn (Ardleigh), Mr. H. Clover, Mr. T. W. Scott, Mr. T. Mason, Mr. W.Saunders, Mr.Beaslin, Mr. Fairhead, Mr. Ray, etc.

The room was crowded, the attendance consisting mainly of working men. The Chairman, in opening the proceedings, said they would all congratulate Sir John Gorst on his return after a successful tour, and thank him for honouring Dedham by making there his first public appearance since his return. (Applause.) The Chairman sketched the circumstances under which the Club was first started, and said he took neither credit nor discredit to himself in connection with the matter. His path from the first had been a very clear one. The result of the parishioners' meeting was the building they now saw, and he ventured to say that the accommodation and the building altogether were very satisfactory. He hoped they would all pull together and that they would make the club a real success, because he was sure it supplied a real want. The Chairman then called upon Sir John Gorst to address the meeting. At the close of the meeting, the Chairman announced that Mr. Arthur Scott and Mr Page would. As provisional secretaries, take the names of intending members of te new club, and that a meeting to appoint a Committee and officers would be convened within a week.

There will be snowdrops and cyclamen, hellebores and primroses, camellia and winter-flowering honeysuckle as well as the catkins of pussy willow and Garrya Elliptica, the silk tassel bush. But don't spend too much time admiring, there's plenty to do including the last chance to finish pruning wisteria. I'll cut back the whippy shoots, already trimmed over the summer, even further to two or three buds. I also want to try and take the plant over an arch, so this summer will try to train some of the whippy shoots where I want them.

Plant lilies this month: I've a huge,

scented Skyscraper (Oriental x Trumpet) lilies in the centre of one bed and Martagons in shadier areas. If your soil is heavier, plant them in pots - five in a 10inch container - and be prepared to stake the taller varieties. Bear in mind that lilies are very toxic to cats though -

so if you have them and they like a nibble on your plants, best choose something else.

There's also plenty I need to do with fruit in the garden and down on the allotment. I'll take secateurs to my gooseberry bushes (no doubt shredding my hands on merciless thorns as I do) to cut back sideshoots to two or three buds. I'll need to take more stems out of the centre of the plant to create a goblet shape and open up the centre. It will improve airflow to reduce mildew and can have the added bonus of allowing birds in to snack on pests. Gooseberry sawfly are the biggest fear and a couple of years ago their caterpillars decimated the leaves of my plants. They don't go for fruit but left unchecked can stunt the plant's growth, so it's always good to know that a man with a drencher of nematodes – and his mate, the brighterplumed female Slumper – will be active later in the year as the weather warms up.

I'll drop forcers over a couple of rhubarb crops this month to encourage bright pink, tender shoots that are ready to harvest earlier than the usual crop. Anything that cuts out the light – like a bucket – will do but avoid clumps that

you forced last year as they'll appreciate the chance to recover. Before you leave the borders, get some mulch on any bare soil. There's just time this month to do it although try to avoid places where you have dwarf bulbs coming through – your tulips and daffs won't mind at all.

I usually have a good bin of compost ready to go by this time of year, which lets me turn the other two bins once it's empty and sets me up for the new season. The mulch will keep in all that lovely moisture from January and December, as well as keep down annual weeds and improve your soil structure as worms take it down. Just spread it good and thick – 2-3 inches – but if you have a heavier soil, it's best to leave this until March when the soil has had more time to warm up. Finally, if you're still trying to work off any seasonal excesses, don't

forget that gardening – especially the hard work of digging, hand weeding and raking - is good for you. But you don't need that added encouragement do you. Do you?

RICHARD BROWNS ENERGY SAVING TIPS

- If you do not need it Switch it off.
- Wear additional warm clothes.
- Try to reduce your room temperature. A 2°C reduction could save about 6% of your heating cost. This is an approximate amount and will vary from house to house.
- Ensure that the boiler runs only when the house or water is cold.
- Use an electric blanket and another for the lounge, OAP stands for "Old and precious" and not what you originally thought!
- Pull curtains, if you have them, they are an excellent blanket.
- Close the door on every room and heat only those rooms you are using
- If you are not using a room turn the thermostat down to about 10°C.
- If the boiler is located outside ensure that it has frost protection.
- Buy a thermometer and reduce the room temperature to find out what is comfortable for you.
- Try and reduce your electricity demand between 5 and 6 PM at a time when the country demand is high. Some companies will pay you to do this.
- If you have a gas or electric hob on your cooker use a burner that is slightly smaller than the pan. The TV frequently shows a small pan on a very large burner, this is obviously ridiculous as it is heating the handle and not the contents.
- Do not waste the hot water to wash small items including hands.
- Heat water in the summer by electricity is very advantageous if you have a night meter.
- When you have a bath, why not leave the hot water in the bath until it is cold and warm the bathroom.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR NEWSLETTER

I hope you were able to have an enjoyable and peaceful festive period and thank you to all the volunteers and key workers for the work over Christmas, New Year and throughout the whole year.

A significant matter affecting the village has been the performance of the 80/80A/81/81A services since the change in operator from Panther to First Essex. Thank you to those who contacted me about your experiences. I collated all evidence sent to me and Essex County Council's (ECC) Passenger Transport team investigated the poor performances and are working to ensure solutions are put in place by First Essex.

The feedback received recently has been that this work has ensured service improvements but please do let me know how the service keeps performing to ensure it is the quality we expect. There are some issues arising from the A12 works that ECC is working with operators and National Highways to resolve.

I was pleased to have secured £12,000, including through our locality budget and with support from the Parish Council, for the delivery of the first step of the Parish's road safety and traffic management plan. We have received the data from the initial surveys just before Christmas and now ECC's technical team is reviewing to propose possible solutions. These solutions will be subject to full consultation with the Parish Council and village and I look forward to sharing these with you soon.

The repairs that I included in the second round of the additional pothole repair fund have commenced or are being scheduled in. The additional pothole repair fund is extra resources I voted for for this financial year and they are defects I put forward in addition to the normal maintenance programme for priority repairs. For Dedham, I put

forward Gun Hill, Shoebridge Hill, The Drift and Stratford Road for the second round, following my submission of Princel Lane and Mill Lane in the first round, the latter which at the time of writing was scheduled in for the repairs.

If you have any highways issues, please do get in touch on cllr.lewis. barber@essex.gov.uk with details and I will do what I can to get the resources to resolve it.

On public transport, I am leading on a project to introduce Digigo, an on demand and electric bus service, to Colchester. This service has proven hugely popular in rural Chelmsford and Braintree where it currently operates on a trial period and it is planned to be expanded into Tendring too. I am keen that Colchester gets this service and I have held positive talks between Essex County Council and Colchester Borough Council. I believe this would also assist minimising traffic and parking pressures in Dedham during the peak season. Please do search Digigo online for more details of what it would involve.

Up until at least 31st March, single fare bus tickets will be capped at £2, regardless of length of route. Please do take advantage of this offer while available. I hope that this can be extended into the longer term.

The A12 widening project to provide three lanes in each carriageway between Chelmsford and Marks Tey, overseen by National Highways, is progressing. Essex County Council supports the principal of the widening but has objected to National Highways' proposals for some of the junctions.

There are various reasons for these objections but the main one is the impact of the junctions on increased volumes of traffic on the local road network. The £35 million investment in resurfacing the A12 between Marks Tey and Stanway has begun.

The works are expected to last until late 2023/early 2024 with the road kept open by a contraflow system. We are liasing with National Highways and Essex Highways to ensure that the impact on the local road network is minimised. We will keep the community updated on these two key road schemes.

I was pleased this financial year to use £1,500 of my locality budget to support the AONB's seasonal rangers, which will assist in managing tourism during peak season. In addition to the Digigo scheme, the other means to manage tourism we are pushing are:

- 1. A campaign to promote safe and sustainable usage of waterways and surrounding areas, working with Essex Fire and Rescue Service to do so.
- 2. Local rural business support network
- 3. Support for litter collection and a designated toilet in the carpark
- 4. A firmer response to illegal trading

Finally, at the time of writing, there is no further update on the National Grid Pylon Scheme. We have attended briefings on the matter and we are continuing to make representations with the Members of Parliament for an offshore option to be progressed instead of the overground pylons. I strongly support upgrading our infrastructure to ensure we have abundant, clean and cheap energy. However, my strong preference is for this to be delivered via offshore infrastructure.

TRAFFIC UPDATE FOR DEDHAM

The results from the Automatic Traffic Counters (ATC's) placed throughout the village between the 6th and 12th of October have now been published. A full set of results can be viewed

However you need to have a lot of patience, a love of statistics, and very good eyesight to make sense of them, so DPC has pulled together some of the facts and figures. Fortunately DPC were able to pay for four extra sites to be covered, Bargate Lane, Coggeshall Road, Long Road West and Castle Hill. We all know from personal experience and figures provided by our Speed Watch team that Dedham has a significant issue with speeding.

These figures make astonishing reading, and to back that up we have chosen to look at the percentages of drivers travelling above the speed limit and include those travelling significantly above the limit i.e. over 40 mph in a 30mph zone. We have chosen this approach because it is a fact that you are statistically more likely to die as speed increases above 30 mph and that you are more likely to be killed on rural roads than urban ones.

BARGATE LANE - classified as a rural lane with a 30-mph limit. Northbound 54.3% of cars were speeding, Southbound 32.0%. We believe there were fewer because the ATC was close to the junction with Long Rd East, so

drivers were only just beginning to accelerate.

GROVE HILL -The percentage of drivers exceeding the 30 mph limit was North East bound 58.7%, South West bound 65.6%. Drivers are clearly not slowing down as they leave the 40 mph limit and reach the 30mph zone. There were two accidents in 2022 alone with cars leaving the road at the at the bottom of Grove Hill. There is a pavement but quite often it is covered in debris and pedestrians are forced to walk in the road.

COGGESHALL ROAD - a main route into Dedham that meets the Dedham Heath crossroads where the priority is wrongly given to the rural lane of Long Road. There are no pavements. Northbound 62.4%, Southbound 65.1%

CASTLE HILL - a main route into Dedham and in particular to the school. Northbound 62.4%, Southbound 65.1%

LONG ROAD WEST - Bearing in mind that LRW currently has a limit of 40mph even though residents and DPC believe that it meets Essex Highways own criteria to be designated a 30-mph zone, plus the fact that there are no pavements. It is on a main bus route and adults and children alike are forced to walk in the road.

There are also significant issues on sunny days when easterly drivers are blinded by the sun in the morning and westerly drivers in the evening. The police have also stated that shadows cast by the trees make it difficult to see pedestrians. Eastbound 18.7%, Westbound 17.7%. A better mathematician than me could work out just how high those percentages would be if the speed limit was just 30 mph!

MILL LANE - this produced some unusual results that we are yet to fully understand with 13% and 15% of vehicles travelling above 30 mph, but with a high proportion travelling at significantly above the 30 mph limit. However, the ATCs were laid in October in relatively poor weather at the end of the tourist season. We are all aware just how busy Mill Lane is in the summer with the car park full, and the narrow pavements full of pedestrians crossing the road on a blind corner. DPC believes that this alone warrants Mill Lane being included in the 20 mph zone proposed in our Local Highways Plan.

THE WAY FORWARD

Essex Highways have requested more information and ATCs will be placed on Ardleigh Road, Brook Street and Crown Street. DPC believes this is a good sign. However, it took 16 months to get the first ATCs laid so nothing will happen overnight. We all know that local councils are strapped for cash.

DPC will continue to campaign for the Traffic Management Plan we submitted in August 2021, particularly in light of the likely increased traffic volumes, resulting from the housing developments in Tendring (Manningtree and Mistley). Essex has a VISION ZERO policy to reduce deaths on the roads and let us hope we do not have to wait for a death or another serious accident to take place before action is taken.

Furthermore Essex and DPC fully support a SUSTAINABLE transport policy. This cannot happen whilst residents do not feel safe enough to walk or cycle along our country lanes, because of the blight of speeding inconsiderate drivers.

WHAT OUR RESIDENTS CAN DO - Make sure we stick to the limits. Report every single accident to the

police and Essex Highways. There is a grave temptation not to report minor bumps and scrapes because we do not think any action will be forthcoming. However, we need to have a record of everything to support our case. SUPPORT the Speed Watch team.

I should like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who gave so generously both in time and contributions to last year's Poppy collection.

Following the success of the sales table in Royal Square previous years, I arranged to do this again. The table collected a total of £1837 and included the card reader of about £634. The ugly skip, present on Remembrance Sunday had been suitably camouflaged by the builder for which we were very grateful.
