With the summer becoming a distant memory and the leaves beginning to turn, it is traditionally the time of our Harvest Thanksgiving Services in Church.

The cereal crops are gathered and stored safely by now, but the farming work carries on tilling the fields and sowing winter crops, repairing boundaries, servicing farm equipment and no doubt many other things those outside of the farming community know nothing about. Life is always busy – but it should never be too busy to say thank you and show appreciation.

Just as Harvest Thanksgiving Services are planned as part of the pattern of agricultural services through out the year, (Plough Sunday, Rogation and Lammas) planning to say thank you is a good thing.

I remember being taught the discipline of writing 'Thank You' notes as a child after Christmas and Birthdays, but whether by text or a phone call or in person, receiving a thank you is always welcomed.

Saying 'Thank You' for special gifts or nice surprises perhaps comes naturally. It takes more discipline to say thank you for the good things we regularly take for granted. Saying a prayer of grace at mealtimes is one way of doing this.

Another way is to have a moment of quiet and reflection towards the end of the day looking back at what has happened. It is surprising how many things there are to be thankful for that may have gone unnoticed.

The Apostle Paul was always giving thanks, especially for the people he had met on his journeys around Asia Minor – nowadays the Easter Mediterranean.

Read the first few verses of his letters to the Ephesians and Colossians in the New Testament. He recognised the good in others and their work to help others and make things better (I Colossians; 3,4).

I wonder if we could begin to notice the positives in our relationships and interactions more, and importantly, show and speak our thankfulness and appreciation. How would that change our lives and society for the better.

I thank God for my friends and family and for all the good things in my life. I hope I don't take these for granted. How about you?

THE PASTORAL TEAM

We have been asked to give an overview of what St Mary's Pastoral Team aims to achieve as well as its background.

The Church of England has always prioritised looking outside of its doors to offer help or comfort to people in the community.

For many years the natural person to do this would have been the parish vicar. Nowadays the church family recognises that this is something that others can offer to do and we have many church members who practice good neighbourliness in various ways.

A few years ago, one of our vicars suggested getting a team together to reach out to our parishioners at specific milestones in their lives and so the Pastoral Team was born.

Initially, the focus was on welcoming new members including those recently

baptised, recognising the anniversary after a wedding and in particular keeping in touch with people after bereavement.

This has spilled over into friendship groups such as Walk and Talk and a monthly lunch at the Essex Rose as well as support for the Duchy Barn coffee mornings. Some members of the team also visit people in their homes.

During the Covid pandemic the Pastoral team led by Revd Antony initiated the Helpline.

We encourage donations to our Food Bank in the church porch which is there for anyone's use

In November each year all are warmly welcomed to a quiet benefice service for bereaved people to remember those we have loved.

Supporting Church music in the Tendring area

The Deanery choir will be singing at St Georges Church, Great Bromley CO7 7HZ at the 11.00am communion service. They will be singing the anthem 'Prevent us, O Lord' by William Byrd, which was sung at the Coronation of H.M. King Charles 3rd. William Byrd (born c. 1539) London, England - died July 4th 1623, was an English organist and composer of the Shakespearean age who is best known for his development of the English madrigal. He also wrote virginal and organ music that elevated the English keyboard style.

Of Byrd's origins and early life in London little is known. He was a pupil and protege of the organist and the composer Thomas Tallis and his first authenticated appointment was as

organist at Lincoln Cathedral (1563). In 1572 he returned to London to take up his post as a gentleman of the Chapel Royal, where he shared the duties of organist with Tallis.

The Deanery choir will be supporting the 'Choral Evensong' service at 3.00pm at All Saints Church, Wrabness. CO11 2TO.

The choir will sing an anthem by William Byrd and the William Smith evensong setting along with a Magnificat and Nune Dimities by C.V. HOME IS WHERE THE HEART IS

You may have seen articles previously in the Parish magazine about a charity called Korban so I wanted to give you a 'behind the scenes' view of this wonderful charity which I've gleaned through my work as a volunteer in their office.

The charity helps young homeless adults in Colchester. It started in 2008 and has been headed up by Mark Wood for over 7 years.

The charity runs two houses, the first of which has places for 5 residents with the second operating as a move-on house for 3.

The first, the hub house called Bethany Place provides a greater level of support for residents, and for those who still need a bit of help to make the transition to independent living so that they can move on to Bethel House.

Bethany Place offers residents the genuine feeling of being in a caring family home; this may be a new experience for them. A Christian ethos underlies all that Korban does. There are friendly chats in the kitchen, social events and weekly one to ones where all manner of topics are discussed to help the residents move forward.

The house also provides an environment where they can learn life skills such as financial management, cooking, cleaning and getting on with others. The warmth and care given is obvious, as is the need for boundaries and sometimes tough love.

A team spirit of working for the greater good is always encouraged, which may be a new way of operating for some, and is a good way to prepare them for the world of work.

I have had the privilege of meeting some of the residents and have been impressed by the way that they respond to living in the house.

Some have become much more open and less cautious in relatively short periods of time and one has recently got a part time job alongside her volunteering.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Korban is planning to buy its hub house which is currently rented from the Diocese of Chelmsford, and has plans to expand the number of places available, so that more young people can be supported.






Middle window, South side of the chancel, left panel St. Stephen.

This month we are going to look at windows depicting Saints. These windows do not show a pictorial narrative but instead show the Saints holding various symbolic items which represent their story. The use of symbolism in art was almost universal in Medieval and Renaissance art and was continued in religious stained glass served as a reminder to worshippers of the lives and deaths of Christian Saints and Martyrs.

Three Saints are depicted in the middle window on the South side of the chancel. In the left hand panel we see the Latin "S'tus Stephanus proto martyr" (Saint Stephen the first martyr). St Stephen was an early member of the Christian Church and one of its first appointed deacons. He enraged many Jews by his teachings and was accused of blasphemy by false witnesses and stoned to death, thus becoming the first Christian Martyr. (Acts 6 and 7).

In this window St Stephen is shown carrying a palm frond in his left hand. A palm frond, from ancient times in Mesopotamia and Egypt, held religious significance as a symbol of victory, triumph and eternal life. This tradition continued with the Jews and Christians. Jesus entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday along a road strewn with palm leaves, a triumphal entry but also predicting his victory over evil and his promise of eternal life to those that followed him. It became the symbol of Christian martyrdom which is why St Stephen is usually depicted holding such a palm frond. His right hand is obscured by the rocks he is holding, signifying his stoning to death.

The Saints

In the central panel we see "S'tus Paulus Apostolus" (Saint Paul the Apostle). St Paul is included amongst the Apostles as although he was not one of the original twelve disciples chosen by Jesus, the Bible tells us that he met Jesus on the road to Damascus and was converted by this experience, and then chosen by Jesus to preach His word. St Paul is often depicted with a sword and a scroll or book, as in this case. The sword, because according to tradition, he was beheaded with a sword, and the book, representing Scripture because he is attributed with writing more books of the Bible than any other single author.

The writing picked out on the open book is somewhat obscured by the lead of the window but is probably the Latin phrase, 'Caritas Christi urget nos' and translates as 'the love of Christ compels us'. This phrase is taken from St. Paul's second letter to the Corinthians (2Cor. 5:14).

In the right hand panel we see "S'tus Lucas evangelista" (Saint Luke the Evangelist). St Luke is shown carrying a pen an a book, signifying that St Luke, of course, wrote one of the four gospels, ostensibly to someone called Theophilus but undoubtedly for more general consumption by both Jews and Gentiles. He set out "to write an orderly account so that you may know the certainty of the things you have been taught" — "of the things that have been fulfilled" (by Jesus) (Luke. I: I -4)



St. Patrick

Next month we will look at some more of the bibles inspirational figures. All of the six Saints depicted individually in the Chancel windows of Dedham Church are mentioned in the bible, if only briefly, but later Saints are often depicted, more commonly in Catholic churches but also in Anglican churches.

For example, in the Anglican church in Porto, in Portugal, is a lovely depiction of St Patrick, Patron Saint of Ireland. Here also symbols abound; by his left foot is a toad and wrapped around the base of his shepherd's crook is a snake and in his left hand he carries a bible. Signifying how he brought the Christian Gospel to his "flock" of Christian followers, conquering witchcraft represented by toads, and evil represented by snakes. This harks back to "the serpent" who tempted Eve in the Garden of Eden and thus led to "the fall of Man." This perpetuates the myth that St Patrick banished both toads and snakes from Ireland.

Dedham Parish Council September 2024 Meeting Notes

It was agreed to appoint Carol Harbach as the new Clerk for the Council.

Within the public open forum discussion a number of issues were raised. These included:

Lots of sewage smells at the west end of the village. It was agreed to make sure relevant authorities such as environmental health had been informed.

Concern was raised about obstacles on the pavements on the high street particularly where the retail outlets have outside tables and chairs. Council will follow this up with relevant retail outlets.

Signage at Long Road crossroads which has been reported to the Highways department..

Ongoing concerns about developments at Petalo Lodge were noted and it was suggested a meeting with appropriate residents, local councillors and members of the parish council be organised, and what actions had taken place.

It was noted that the planned blue plaque on the Essex Rose and the memorial bench for Iris Hindley were still to be completed. Council agreed to progress this.

Pylons Campaign.

The Parish Council's response followed similar lines to those of Dedham Vale Society and Colchester City Councils and the link to this is on the website Home page.

Planning Applications.

The Council had no concerns about the planned planning applications in the village.

Traffic and Parking

It was reported that several signs had been erected around the village using the paintings from the children at the primary school.

River Management

The terms of reference for the group were approved. It was suggested a meeting is held with Anglian Water at the sewage farm.

It was agreed to progress in preparation for next year signage on the bridge regarding river water quality.

A joint meeting had been held with Stratford St. Mary Parish Council and it was agreed to hold another in the autumn.

Dedham Youth Club

The Council welcomed the proposal to re-establish the youth club and it was agreed to seek further information about working with East Anglia Youth Clubs before agreeing to specific funding requests.

Resignation of Councillor Mole as Chair. Due to family reasons Councillor Mole informed the Council that he would be stepping down as chair but

GREENER DEDHAM, HARVEST TIME


Harvest time is known for an abundance of food, but an abundance of food can also pose challenges for how to store it, and how to keep it all fresh. Here are some tips on how to store and preserve your food so that it doesn't go to waste - saving you money, and of course, doing the planet some good, too.

- I. Do you have more herbs than you know what to do with? Try preserving them by chopping them up finely and place them in an ice cube tray. Top up the rest of the ice cube tray with water and freeze. Not only have you saved your herbs from going to waste, you now have nice, neat little cubes ready for cooking with.
- 2. Store your leafy greens and herbs upright in air-tight containers (you could even wash out and re-use old coffee tubs or jam jars), with a couple of inches of water at the bottom to keep them crisp and fresh. You can also pop in a paper towel into opened bags of salad leaves to help them last longer, too.
- 3. Wash berries in a solution of 3 cups of water mixed with 1 cup of white vinegar, and dry before storing. Store in an air-tight container with paper towel (to soak up an excess moisture)
- Keep apples and plums by slicing them, shaking them gently with lemon and sugar, and freezing
- 5. Have you had a particularly bountiful courgette harvest? Slice them, blanch in boiling water for about a minute, dry and freeze

ROAD SAFETY


Well done to the pupils and especially the winners from Dedham Primary School who worked so hard to produce our latest edition of antispeeding competition posters.



Thank you to those residents who have responded with such enthusiasm. The village's children are our future and they deserve to be able to walk our streets and lanes in safety. A word about how this competition came about.

Dedham has a major speeding problem and this has been proven by expensive ATCs (automatic traffic counters) laid by Essex Highways and data from SpeedWatch.

Three years ago DPC submitted a Traffic Management Plan to EH (available on DPC website) and the response to this has been absolutely nothing.



So the posters are a result of frustration at the lack of action and it seems that we as a village need to help ourselves! Hence the poster competition. We also provided heart shaped 30mph bin stickers to residents on our "rat runs" to represent what the majority want for the village.

One of the biggest complaints DPC have is about the missing 30mph signs that EH have failed to replace, and so they were also placed on posts with missing signs-unfortunately some have



been removed.

In 2024 we were delighted to get those sessions going once again, having engaged a local, qualified Coach to offer Saturday morning sessions for juniors (9-9.45am Ages 7-11 and 10.30-11.30am Ages 11-15).

It's been fantastic to see young, aspiring cricketers attending on a regular basis and even working together to design a new logo and playing kit for the junior section! We're indebted to Dedham Parish Council for their amazing support that's also enabled us to purchase training and playing equipment for our youngsters, to help us achieve our ambition of having junior teams enjoying competitive cricket in the Summer of 2025.

Our juniors will now spend the winter playing indoor cricket and further honing their skills ready for their competitive debuts next Summer.

2024 has seen our 1st (and only, for now!) XI experience our most successful season for some time, with a first double over Leavenheath for many years a particular highlight, and as ever some enjoyable trips to beautiful grounds across Essex and Suffolk, and even Kent (Hartley Country Club CC) and Norfolk (as part of our annual cricket tour).

Building upon this success, we've submitted an application to re-enter the Saturday league system in 2025 after a number of years away and so, once again, local residents will get to watch league action at our beautiful ground in the heart of the village, maybe even with a cold beer or glass of wine from the Sports Club!

We'll run a social XI too next year, with occasional Sunday and midweek fixtures for those that just can't get enough of the game. Our Committee has plans to improve its fundraising and promotional efforts, after a first and successful stab for some time at a mini Cricket Festival in July of this year.

We're indebted to our sponsors – The Spa Pavillion in Felixstowe and IAS – for their generous and continued support to the Club and plan to offer more opportunities for local businesses to get involved in 2025. WINTER IS COMING; LET'S GO!

Well summer is well and truly over, and the days are getting cooler and shorter, but there is still plenty to do in the garden before wetter and more wintery weather makes it harder to be on or working the soil.

I still have some dahlias flowering and with continued deadheading they may carry on into November, before the first proper frosts blackens them and I have to cut them down and decide which ones to lift.

Plumes of Miscanthus grasses glow red and silver in the sun, alongside asters and sedums giving bees the last of the nectar to turn into winter stores.

Although the chill may be ending some perennial flowers, it's also turning my Euonymous alatus – the winged spindle or burning bush – shades of deep pink and red. Last year, I even had some grapes on a vine in the middle of the month.

You can be getting ready for a colourful spring by getting your bulbs in now. Get daffodils in as soon as you can but tulips will be better off if you plant in November as the colder weather will provide some protection from tulip fire (which sounds very dramatic and means brown spots on flowers with withered

and distorted leaves).

Plant bulbs to three times their own depth: the deeper you plant the better protected they are and the more likely they are to return.

The planners among you may be looking ahead to our Spring Show in April and thinking about what daffodils to exhibit. Search 'daffodil' on our website for a brief article on key classes so you can buy bulbs to match.



Grasses and dahlia

I'll start preparing my pelargoniums for overwintering indoors, which basically means protecting from frost, reducing watering as the plants go dormant, and maximising the amount of light they get. Botrytis cinerea can be the biggest problem as winter plants need good air circulation to prevent this grey mould, so I avoid wrapping them against frost, spacing plants well apart instead. As things are never certain, I'll also take some cuttings and bring them on in a heated propagator.

If you have a fruit and veg patch, you might be cutting back the fruited canes of summer raspberries and tying in the green canes that grew this year for harvest next. I've several clumps of rhubarb in the garden and on the allotment and I'll check to see if any are congested and need dividing by digging them up and splitting them with a sharp spade. Chuck any that look past it and replant the rest.



Autumn Colour

I start raising the blades on the lawnmower this month and will trim when the weather is drier. I also run my electric scarifier over it to lift the thatch and dead grass that has accumulated from the summer months.

I've really reduced my lawn to expand my borders, so it's more likely that I'll get round to spiking it with a fork to loosen any compaction and improve drainage. When rain is forecast, I'll spread some autumn lawn feed and maybe some seed mixed with a bit of compost to revive it a bit.

There's plenty to do this month – so let's go!

Our 2024/25 speaker programme kicks off on Wednesday 9th October – a change from the usual date – with Mark Richardson and multi award-winning garden designer Penelope Walker (the Panathlon Joy Garden, Chelsea 2024) who will take us 'behind the scenes at the Chelsea Flower Show'. They'll give us a fascinating insight into balancing planting with hard landscaping in show

gardens and how the principles might be applied in our own. Join us from 7.15pm: it's free for members, while guests are always welcome for just £2 including refreshments. See you there!
