RURAL MISSIONER

'Jesus is the Light of the World!'

During December and into the New Year, festive light displays in our homes brighten the dark nights. I can remember as a child trying to spot the occasional Christmas tree with lights peering through windows as we drove past. Nowadays it seems the whole of many gardens and houses are festooned with brightly lit decorations.

Yet it is not just the dark winter evenings they cheer up; the joy of the decorations bring relief to much of the doom and gloom of the tragic and seemingly evil happenings from around the world. But the prologue of John's Gospel read as a lesson in church at Christmastime, says that 'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it' (John Iv5). For Christians, Jesus as the Light of the World, brings hope, love and light into our world.

With constant 24-hour news bulletins it can seem that all there is, is doom and gloom. As I write this early in November, there has just been the tragic stabbing incident on the train from Doncaster to London.

Yet on Radio 4's 'Thought for the Day' (3 November 2025) Chine McDonald, Director of Theos, the Religion and Society Think Tank, reflects there are many acts of human kindness and courage also emerging from the

devastating attack. I think these are the sparks of light that are not extinguished by the darkness of a fallen and broken world.

Chine explains that acts of courage and bravery are instinctive; in times of danger, we naturally protect the vulnerable and care for those in need. Barriers of difference that society often emphasises are wiped away in the face of a common enemy or threat. The parable of the Good Samaritan told by Jesus in Luke chapter 10, challenges us to act like this every day, not just when a threat is present.

As we celebrate Christmas this year, joyfully surrounded by festive lights, let us also reach out in selfless acts of compassion and care to those in need around us. God reached out in the darkness and sent a Saviour to shine as the Light. The babe at Bethlehem brings light, love and hope into our world. I wish you a happy and peaceful Christmas and a warm welcome to any of our services in this festive season.



December 7th

The Deanery Choir will be singing at **St** Nicholas Church, Harwich CO12 **3DR** at the 3pm Patronal service. The choir will sing the anthem 'A hymn to the Virgin' by Benjamin Britten. Britten was born in Lowestoft, Suffolk, the son of a dentist. He showed talent from an early age. He studied at the Royal College of Music in London and privately with the composer Frank Bridge. Britten first came to public attention with the a cappella choral work 'A Boy Was Born' written in 1934. With the premiere of Peter Grimes in 1945, he leapt to international fame. Over the next 28 years, he wrote 14 more operas, establishing himself as one of the leading 20th-century composers in the genre.

December 13th (Saturday)

The Deanery Choir will be singing at their annual event 'A living Christmas '25' at **St Osyth Parish Church, St Osyth CO16 8NU** at 7pm. This concert tells the Christmas story with readings and music all of which is written by contemporary composers and arrangers. The choir is accompanied by Peter Clayton and a leaving collection will be made for church funds. One not to miss!

Dedham Parish Council Meeting Report – Monday, 3rd November 2025

Parking in the High Street.

It was noted that the December Parish Council meeting on Ist December will include a presentation from NEPP (North Essex Parking Partnership) on proposals for changes to parking regulations in Dedham High Street.

Public space protection order

It was reported that Babergh District Council is still considering the proposal of a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) for the areas near the river. The Council agreed to set up a small group to develop this further.

Terms of reference for groups

There are now agreed terms of reference for the following groups:

- Planning
- Infrastructure and Community,
- Finance
- Personnel.

The social media policy was also agreed on.

Fish and chip van

Concern was expressed by some councillors regarding the new location of the Fish and Chip Van as it was deemed to present safety problems for the High Street.

It was agreed that the Council needs to clarify whether the owners of the van have a street trading licence. Also relocating the van to the car parks was not an option following clarification with NEPP.

The owner of the fish and chip van is open to ideas as where to park and serve food.

Members of the Council will contact relevant local bodies to ascertain status of food trading licence for the fish and chip van.

Junction of East Lane and Crown Street

Several residents commented about the bad state of the kerb near the junction. Concern was also expressed about an ongoing problem of flooding from overflowing water near the junction. This is being investigated.

Speeding in the village

A resident spoke regarding the speeding vehicles and reported that there were over 700 speeding cars last year. One example of speeding at over 100 miles per hour was recorded.

The Speedwatch group urgently need more members to help with their monitoring of speeding in the village.

The primary school are again providing paintings on speeding to be distributed on boards around the village.

Following the last Parish Council meeting a special meeting had been held on Bargate Lane with Essex County Councillor Barber to discuss speeding by the bridge. It was agreed that some form of priority notice needs to be erected.

Parish plan

Work on this is continuing, including identifying and contacting local businesses, charities and voluntary groups.

Dedham, Munnings Art Museum and Constable.

There is likely to be an increase in the number of people coming to the village due to 250th anniversary of John Constable and the Munnings Art Museum 65th anniversary. The Parish Council will need to think about how we can respond to these events. There are a range of events being planned by other villages in the area to celebrate the anniversary of Constable. Dedham also needs to think about how, or what they will put on for these events.

One proposal regarding the Munnings Art Museum anniversary is an oral history project involving residents.

With respect to the Constable anniversary, it was agreed to contact East Bergholt Council with a view to some potential joint activities. Ideas suggested included Constable walks between East Bergholt and Dedham – "walk in the foot-steps of John Constable".

Ardleigh surgery

A report from resident, who is on the Ardleigh Surgery Patients Committee was given, particularly with regard to what the Dedham Surgery was used for and how often. It was noted that Doctors are present at the surgery on Mondays and Wednesday, and nurses on Monday to Thursday.

Pylons update

It was noted that the Council will reply to the latest consultation process.

Grant applications

The grant application from the Church PCC in respect of the churchyard was agreed.

Also there are ongoing discussions with the Sports Club regarding insurances.

Planning matters

Members of the Planning group had a positive meeting with a representative of the Colchester City Council planning team. Among the items discussed were recent refusals for planning permission and ongoing issues with a number of local properties.

Co-option to the council

The Council agreed to the proposal regarding the proposed co-option.

MUNNINGS' HOME TO BE OPEN TO PUBLIC

Next month Lady Munnings, widow of Sir Alfred Munnings is to open her beautiful home Castle House Dedham to the public.

Scores of pictures by Sir Alfred. some of them never before on public view will be on display They cover his entire career as an artist from the time he started sketching as a child of four until his last years.

Sir Alfred died in July 1959 at the age of 80 and Castle House has now become a shrine for his work. Every wall is hung with dozens of his paintings His studio in the garden is left almost exactly as it was at his death with his brushes and tubes of paint still laid out ready for use.

NOT FOR SALE

Lady Munnings says she has no idea of the value of the collection at Castle House. Since his death some of Sir Alfred's works have fetched quite high prices in the London sale rooms. but Lady Munnings is adamant on one point None of the pictures here at Castle House is for sale" she declares.

Facing the visitor as he steps into the entrance hall is a magnificent portrait of

Lady Munnings as a voung woman proudly riding side-saddle on a magnificent thoroughbred horse as it strides across the wild Exmoor countryside. But Lady Munnings is certain that Sir Alfred will not be remembered only for his equestrian portraits, and the many lovely landscapes that adorn the walls of Castle House would seem to support her belief.

Display cabinets have been lent to her by the Victoria and Albert Museum to hold Sir Alfred's collections of rare china and Georgian silverware. In one of them lies the embalmed body of her famous Pekingese dog. Black Knight surrounded by valuable china.

SINGING DOG

Outside in the paddock Lady Munnings has four horses but at present her principal pet is her singing dog Toby, a dog of indeterminate breed, eight years old, regularly accompanies Lady

Munnings to church "I have it on the very highest authority that there is no law in this country to stop a dog from going to church", she says.

Toby, who features in Sir Alfred's painting "Does the subject matter?" which was the problem picture of the year at the 1956 Royal Academy, has already earned considerable sums for charity by his singing recitals.

Wearing a red jacket, and with a white ruff round his neck Toby sits up on his hind legs, and while Lady Munnings beats time he raises his voice in song in a melody that is all his own. Lady Munnings declares that he can reach A flat. His voice has been recorded by the B.B.C. and broadcast in their overseas service.

Evening News (London) - Friday 2nd June 1961

'BRAVO' TO BEGIN

First thing the half-a-crown visitors to Castle House, Dedham, will see when 76-year-old Lady Munnings opens her home to the public on a Sunday is sign reading "Bravo" in eight-inch letters. And Lady Munnings will explain that she had it done for Sir Alfred Munnings "because he was a wonderful artist and a wonderful husband."

The house, which she has arranged as a "shrine" to Sir Alfred, who died in 1959 and whose paintings cover the walls, is full of surprises. Her singing dog Toby, still running around the Essex village with a collar inscribed "Sir Alfred Munnings, Royal Academy, Piccadilly." is ready to oblige with a song.

But these surprises are likely to be overshadowed by verbal ones when Lady Munnings. who makes a charming guide, gives visitors the commentary she tried out on me to-day.

It began in the dining-room where she recalled how a horse came to dinner one New Year's Eve and it concluded in the studio where it went something like this: "These are things Munnings did when he was two and three and four and five-and these are his riding-boots That's the saddling enclosure at Epsom. I lost on every race yesterday and that's the most wonderful sky. That's the most wonderful horse in movement, only Munnings or Stubbs could have done it."

And so on, all with tremendous verve and spirit. It should bring the house down.

Suffolk and Essex Free Press -Thursday 15th June 1961 MUNNINGS HOME ATTRACTS CROWDS

Open to the public for the first time last Sunday was Castle House, Dedham, the home of Lady Munnings and the late Sir Alfred Munnings. Extra police had to be sent from Colchester to control the traffic, which queued up to see the house hung with Sir Alfred's paintings. With an entry charge of a half-crown, about 600 people paid to see the paintings and the studios where he worked

Iohn Constable

On June 11, 2026, it will be 250 years since world renowned artist John Constable was born in East Begholt. The anniversary is being marked by a series of major art exhibitions and events at Christchurch Mansion in Ipswich – starting in Easter and running all year.

While the Constable 250 events will attract national and international attention, East Bergholt Parish Council is focusing on the landscape and views – in and near the village – that inspired much of Constable's work.

In Our View events are already being planned by the East Bergholt Society, St Mary's Church, Constable Hall, and the National Trust.

Ipswich will take centre stage in a national celebration marking the 250th anniversary of the birth of iconic Suffolkborn artist John Constable (1776–1837).

Recognised as one of Britain's most influential painters, Constable's legacy will be honoured through a year-long programme of exhibitions at Ipswich Borough Council's Christchurch Mansion. Constable 250 will feature three major exhibitions, led by Colchester and Ipswich Museums supported by The National Lottery Heritage Fund, the Weston Loan Programme with Art Fund, Arts Council England, and other key partners.

These will showcase rare and internationally significant artworks on loan from the Tate, Victoria & Albert Museum, Royal Academy, National Galleries of Scotland, and the Government Art Collection.

Across the anniversary year, Constable's art and legacy will be explored through: Constable: A Cast of Characters-28th March to 14th June 2026.

Introducing those who inspired and supported the artist, featuring personal letters, period costume, and historical artefacts. Together with loans from private collections will be works from the Colchester and Ipswich collections by a wide range of artists with links to Constable, and new sculpture by artist and descendant, Sasha Constable.

Constable: Walking the Landscape - I Ith July to 4th October 2026.

A celebration of Constable's deep connection to the Suffolk countryside he loved and was passionately inspired by, including rarely seen works on loan and in Suffolk for the first time, and his most personal paintings from his childhood home.

Constable to Contemporary - 24th October 2026 to 28th February 2027. A dynamic exhibition exploring modern responses to Constable's legacy, with new works by local artists and community groups.

DEDHAM PARISH MAGAZINE IS 150 YEARS OLD IN 2026.

Essex Herald - Tuesday 11 January 1876

ESSEX ALMANAC AND COUNTY HANDBOOK.

To the Editor of the Essex Herald. SIR,-On page 51 of the above I find it is stated that "The patronage of the Dedham lectureship is in the hands of the governors of the Grammar school." Allow me to inform you that this is not the case, for in consequence of a petition presented by myself to her Majesty's Charity Commissioners, calling their attention to the subject, the patronage is now in the hands of trustees, and "The members of the new governing body of Dedham Grammar school will not in that capacity have an preferential or special claim to be placed in future on the trust of these charities."

I send a copy of a portion of the "order" of the commissioners, and should be obliged if you would make the correction in your next edition, so that the parishioners and the public may be correctly informed. I am, gentlemen, your most obedient servant.

A PARISHIONER. Dedham-heath January 2nd, 1876.

Essex Standard - Friday 28 January 1876

DEDHAM. PIGEON ((CLAY) SHOOTING.

On Thursday, Jan. 20, the annual pigeon shooting was celebrated at the Compasses Inn. The shooting arrangements were conducted by the landlord, Mr. James Gooding, on an extensive piece of pastureage by the Water Mill, The sport was witnessed during the day by between three and four hundred people, including some crack shots from Cambridge, Long Melford, Bury, Colchester, Marks Tey, Ipswich, Harwich, and Hadleigh. Shooting commenced at twelve o'clock with the first match, for a fat hog, value £5; ten members at 10s. each, entrance; handicapped from 21 to 28 yards, 5 traps, 80 yards boundary, 1.4 oz. of shot, the use of both barrels. The match was excitably contested, resulting in a victory for Mr. Kerridge, of Bradfield, who killed his five birds in good form, "Mr. Dickybird" being second. Some firstclass shooting was shown in the various sweepstakes competed for by Mr. J. Antom, Mr. Kerridge, and "Mr. Dickybird." Mr. J. Antom's performance was particularly worthy of note, as in seven sweeps, three birds each, he stopped 19 out of 21. The sport closed about 4 p.m., when the company adjourned to the Compasses Inn, where a bountiful spread was placed before them by host Gooding, to which about 50 sat down.

Note: The Compasses Inn was situated in the High Street on the corner of Princel Lane. The Inn closed in 1912. Little Merchant Shop is now located there.

IN THE BLEAK MIDWINTER, FROSTY WIND MADE MOAN

A bit dramatic perhaps, but we've reached the traditional winter months with their shorter days and darker nights, when temperatures have usually dropped and the wind and wet makes being out in the garden a less than pleasurable experience. For some, bleak indeed.

However, for hardier souls, less trepidatious about a few degrees here or there or a bit of wind, there remain a few jobs to keep the garden at its best. With many trees and shrubs in winter dormancy, you can give them a prune now. Wisteria is an important one, following up the summer prune (where you cut back those whips to six or seven buds). Now is the time to cut back further to one or two buds — I usually do two, so there's a spare if one fails. These summer and winter prunes will help wisteria flower well next year.

You can also winter prune apple and pear trees to improve their shape with some judicious cuts (there's something about being able to chuck a hat – or possibly a pigeon? – through the branches). Otherwise just look for diseased branches or crossed ones which might rub together, damaging bark and letting disease in.

I want to replant everything in one of my larger borders ahead of the new season, so will hope for weather that's good enough to be digging everything out and putting it into better position. There are some large peonies that aren't flowering well, which is probably because a few years of mulching has buried the eyes too deeply. Digging them up, perhaps splitting a few, before replanting them more shallowly will help them put on a better show.

I also need to move some eupatorium to the back of the border as they reach nearly 8ft tall by the end of summer and are preventing a climbing red rose from seeing the sun.

Provided the ground isn't absolutely sodden, I'll be in the apiary; giving it a good weed, turning the compost bins and doing some cutting back while the bees are clustered and much less active. I'll check they've got feed (fondant and pollen patties) in case winter is mild and

they need the energy boost after some short cleansing trips out of the hive.

I started forcing some prepared hyacinth bulbs back in October so they should be ready to bring indoors this month, and should come into flower for Christmas, filling the house with their heady scent.

For 'inside times' – and yes, there will be plenty of those for me too – there will be fireside trawling through catalogues to see if there is a new plant I absolutely must have. I've been inspired by our October speaker from Benton End Flower Farm, so will be looking at seed catalogues for some annual flowers to grow next year, while January is usually pre-orders for dahlia tubers. There's always room for another dahlia or two surely.


I generally enjoy these months after struggling through October and November when the days get shorter, wetter and windier. Although the days are even shorter of course (and darker) Christmas brings not just sparkle, but also the shortest day and increasing light as the days move towards spring and the chance to be planting and growing again.

While I confess I'm not the first person you'd turn to for the latest wellbeing fad, I am a huge believer in the benefits of gardening. Increasing our exposure to natural light – even on overcast days – can lift the mood. An early riser, I'm glad that morning light is especially helpful for resetting the body clock. I've found having two Scottish terriers who insist on an early walk is great for easing into the day.

The gentle physical activity of pruning, tidying and mulching increases circulation and body temperature and gets the blood pumping to combat lethargy. The mild activity also releases endorphins, our body's natural mood enhancers. Just being outside in nature or tending to natural things (even indoor

plants if you really can't bear to be out) lowers the stress hormone, cortisol.

So if you struggle in these winter months, what about getting a feeder to watch the variety of grateful birds that visit your garden or taking a walk in a local arboretum (like the 200-acre one at Markshall) or a winter garden (Hyde Hall, Cambridge University Botanic Garden or Anglesey Abbey are some good ones in the region).




